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WINE GROWING IN SWITZERLAND.

Although, during scarcely half a century the cultivation of the vineyards has had a regress of more than 50 per cent. in Switzerland, Valais not only did not let it diminish by an inch, but has even extended it considerably during the same time. It occupied 2500 ha. at the end of the 19th century and now it has extended over more than 3300 ha. If one considers the configuration of the country, the nature of the soil, one may be astonished that the inhabitants of Valais have had the courage to clear the land and to plant under such difficult conditions and that they continue to do it, in spite of hard times and unfavourable economic circumstances.

A great part of the Valais vineyards has been created amidst rocks that have been blown up by mines, whilst the stones were crushed into sand. In other places, the most golden and richest grapes at Montibex, and at Ravaney, for instance, grow where formerly the soil was covered in dire confusion with stones and gravel, rolled down from the mountain by some torrent.

If the Valais wine-dressers were not discouraged when facing the formidable toil exacted by the creation of their vineyard, if they go on quietly with their hard labour, it is that the climate is more favourable than anywhere else to the life and growth of this delicate plant, from the moment when it bursts under April's gentle breezes, out of the frail and tender winter buds, to the sunny days of late autumn which burnish the grapes.

During the month of its active life, the wine is flooded in dazzling sunshine, the light of which is hardly ever veiled by mist or cloud.

Tradition maintains that the first wine stocks were planted by the Romans and that later on old soldiers brought from foreign lands those clear fruited wines that are still now the pride and joy of their great grandchildren. One of the charms of the Valais vineyards is that they provide not only ordinary wines for everyday use, but also those that utmost refinement may require for the perfect arrangement of a sumptuous meal.

Among those that are called ordinary wines, a distinction must be made according to their origin and the particular vineyard they come from. The "Fendant," for instance, which is now considered as the standard of the wine-stocks in this country, is very different, according to the place it comes from. Pleasant to taste, agreeably flavoured everywhere, it becomes, in certain parts particularly well situated, so fine and perfect that it is a produce of the highest kind and greatest worth, such as the Montibex and the Johannisberg. Next to these come the Dôle, velvety and dark red, leaving at the bottom of the glasses like a far away reflection of the old convents of Burgundy whence it came.

Besides these three wines, Valais offers the numerous army of its other products, dry like Chablis or sweet as southern wines: Muscat, Malvoise, Humagne, Arvine, Amigne, Hermitage, Rouge du Pays. S.J.T.
