BRENNO BERTONI

Brenno Bertoni, State Councillor, has entered into his 8th decade, and we are glad to give a few data of the life of this popular and esteemed statesman.

He was born on the 7th of August, 1860, in a little mountain village in the valley of Blenio. At Geneva, where he studied law, he founded the liberal paper Riforma, he also took an active part in the 1890 political movements of the canton Ticino, which government appointed him as a judge. During three periods he sat in the Grand Council, and from 1914-1920 he was a member of the National Council; since 1920 he has represented the canton of Ticino in the State Council.

Being the author of many books on Swiss law which are quoted as authority throughout Switzerland, he was for several years Professor at the Faculty of Law at the University in Berne. The University of Zurich bestowed on him the degree of "doctor honoris causa."
