MUSIC IN THE COLONY.

Now that the arrangements for the concert of the Swiss Institute Orchestra, on February 12th, are complete, one is permitted to say something of the programme. It is certainly an interesting one. A noteworthy feature of the orchestral side of the entertainment is the atmosphere of liveliness which pervades the half-dozen works which are to be played. For those who like something a little heavier there is an excerpt from Wagner's "Meistersinger," but apart from this, the spirit of gaiety ushered in by the delightful "Coppélia" ballet of Delibes, is maintained throughout. Considerable credit is due to those responsible for the selection of so spirited a programme. Little need be said of the Choral Society's share in the proceedings, except that the co-operation of these fine singers is hailed by their fellow artists of the Orchestra with as lively a sense of satisfaction as their singing invariably is by the Colony at large.

Madame Pellet, also, is already known to us. Her soprano, with that lovely warmth of tone so rarely heard in this voice, is an acquisition we would not willingly forego; particularly when she is to sing "By the Waters of Minnetonka."

A word of exhortation to lovers of song who have not yet heard Mr. Arthur Cranmer. Don't miss the opportunity of hearing that great artist at Conway Hall. Those of us who heard (and saw) him as "Dalma" in "The Immortal Hour" six or seven years ago, will not readily forget the experience. In opera and on the concert platform he is equally admirable. He has, as "The Times" said of him, "a voice of rich quality not unlike the middle notes of the Cor Anglais."

Subscribers to the Swiss Observer will receive, with the issue of February 8th, a complete programme of the concert. On the front page of this will be found the most convenient means of travel, for the benefit of those who are unacquainted with the locality of Conway Hall. S.
