### MOTOR VEHICLES CENSUS.

During 1930, a total of 124,676 motor vehicles were in use in Switzerland, consisting of 60,735 cars, 46,421 motor cycles, 15,843 lorries, and 1,677 tractors.

### EXPENDITURE ON SWISS RAILWAY ELECTRIFICATION.

According to a report issued recently by the Union of Swiss Banks, a total of £27,176,000 has so far been expended by the Swiss Federal Rail-way authorities on railway electrification in the country. Of the total, £6,144,000 has been spent on power stations, £4,756,000 on contact lines, £2,964,000 on l.p. apparatus, £1,704,000 an trans-former stations, £1,628,000 on transmission lines, and £9,980,000 on electrical rolling stock.

The alarm was given shortly before 1 o'clock p.m. and the fire brigade arrived promptly to find that part of the building was enveloped in flames. Unfortun-ately the loss of a life is to be registered. The wife of the housekeeper, was trapped by the fire, but was able to leap from the third floor, and although she was caught up, she had received such serious burns that she afterwards expired in hospital. her husband also was serionsly burned. hospital, her husband also was seriously burned. The damage is partly covered by insurance, but is nevertheless considered to be extensive.

It is reported that the couple went through a divorce some time ago, and the husband left for Paris, whilst the wife took up a situation in a watch factory. Some time ago, Pedruzzi seemed to have returned to Bienne, in order to induce his former wife to return to him, this she faitly refueed after a heated argument which took place in a little Restaurant at the Aussern Dufourstrasse, Pedruzzi fired two shots at his wife, killing her instantaneously, he then turned the weapon on himself and expired shortly after the arrival of the police.

### LAUSANNE.

LAUSANNE. As part of the arrangements for the big Anglo- American Music Conference in August, we are informed that two British choirs are going to transport themselves to Lausanne. One is the South-West Choral Society and the other the boys' choir from Firth Park, Sheffield. In ad-dition to these sporting units the conference is to have its own choir conducted by Professor W. G. Whittaker, of the University of Glasgow, and Bruce Carey, chorus master of the Philadelphia Symbhony Orchestra. Symphony Orchestra.

Performances will be given in the Cathedral Lausanne, and it is expected that the choirs will give a short programme from a steamer on the lake on that evening (Aug. 1st) when Switzer-land holds her Fète National and bonfires light up the mountain heights, and every town and village on the shore has its fireworks and other illuminations.

Sir Henry Hadow (British president) and Dr. John Erskine (American president) preside over the deliberations of the conference. Mr. Stanley Roper, organist to H.M. Chapels Royal, and Pro-fessor J. P. Marshall, of Boston University, have charge of the musical programmes.

### BELLINZONA.

The congress of the "Jeunesse Socialiste Suisse" was held last Sunday at Bellinzona. About 650 delegates, amongst them 150 lady members arrived by special train. In the proces-sion, which was formed, over 1,000 persons were counted. On the "Place de l'Indépendance" a meeting was held, which was addressed by M. E. Patocchi, M. Canevascini, State Councillor and M. Grimm, National Councillor. During the afternoon a great number of the delegates made a trip to Lugano.

Well the sun brightly smiled at all enquirers, young and old, and before breakfast was over, the glad tidings, that Herne Hill would be the meeting place brought joy and happiness to many of the youngsters. But alas, the Swiss seem not to be in the good books of St. Peter, before lunch, threatening clouds assembled and shortly after the programme had started, rain set in and, with the exception of a few intervals, persistently kept us company. us company.

Vice-Presi-dent, who most efficiently deputised for the President, M. Ch. A. Barbezat, who was un-avoidably prevented from being present, owing to his absence on the Continent. The proceedings were interrupted for a short time, whilst Monsieur Paravicini addressed the numerous gathering by expressing his pleasure at being once again able to be present at the Swiss Sports, an institution which has turned out to be year after year such an extreemly successful and gay affair.
