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**CH. EMILE KUDERLI †**

On Thursday, September the 17th, the funeral of Ch. Emile Kuderli took place at the crematorium at Woking.

The sudden death, at the early age of 47, caused through an attack of appendicitis, for which an operation proved unsuccessful, came to many of his friends as a great shock, as he had only recently returned from his holiday seemingly in good health.

Mr. Kuderli was born at Dübendorf (Zurich) in 1884, and came to this country in 1904 where he entered the firm of Messrs. Im Obersteg, Forwarding Agents, with whom he remained until the outbreak of the war in 1914, when he returned to Switzerland to fulfil his military obligations. After his demobilisation a few months later, he returned and took up an appointment with the European and General Express Co., Ltd., which terminated after the Armistice. In June 1919 he joined in with his former colleague Mr. A. B. Chalmers, and together they founded the Transoceanic Forwarding Co., Ltd., a firm which has attained a respected position in the Forwarding World, and of which he remained a Partner and Director until his untimely death.

Mr. Kuderli, who resided at 1, Crescent Road, Wimbledon, S.W.20., was a member of the City Swiss Club since 1911. He leaves a widow, a son aged 15, and two younger daughters to whom we express, on behalf of the Swiss Colony our deepest sympathy.—Few were privileged to know this quiet, unassuming man, but those who did, knew that he had a heart of gold, he was a good and true Swiss, and his compatriots have every reason to be proud of his record, which—alas—all too early came to a finish.

**THEODORE SURER †**

A little known compatriot though no less a true son of Helvetia was buried quietly on Tuesday, Sept the 8th. It was Theodore Surer who died from injuries received in a motor accident.

Born in Stein a/Rhein in 1899, Theodore Surer was educated in Switzerland and after spending two years in Italy he started business on his own account in this country as a fruit importer and agent; he was then only 27 years of age. Through hard work and personal service his small business soon expanded and after having traded first in Mincing Lane and then in Monument Street he finally secured spacious sale rooms in the heart of this particular trade at 37 King Street, Covent Garden, W.C.2.

Mr. Surer was of a very quiet and reserved disposition and his long business hours allowed him little time to spend outside his own family. It was only during lunch time that he was able to meet his compatriots when his dry humour and original terseness were always a source of amusement.

Mr. Surer who resided at 3, Pickhurst Rise, West Wickham (Kent), leaves a widow and child, and on behalf of the Swiss Colony we wish to tender sincere sympathy to the bereaved family.

**FROM THE SHOE AND BOOT INDUSTRY.**

At a delegate meeting of the Swiss association of shoe and boot retailers a resolution was carried strongly resenting the interference of the manufacturers in endeavouring to fix the retail prices of their particular makes. It was stated that the selling expenses varied in the different districts and that the retail prices had to be adapted to local conditions.

The well-known boot manufactory Bally is celebrating this year the 80th anniversary of its foundation. The firm was started by Carl Franz Bally in the autumn of 1851 and gradually developed from a modest installation at Schoenenwerd to a vast undertaking which at present employs in different factories of Switzerland about 6,000 hands. Considerable difficulties had to be surmounted in the early years and it was only through an export department in 1855 that the undertaking became firmly established.
