##### APPENZEL.

At the general Meeting of the Société du Chemin de Fer du Saentis the shareholders decided by 225 votes against 47 to discontinue the scheme of building the line from Wasserauen to the top of the Saentis. The amount for completion, amounting to 25,000 francs, could not be raised and the project, therefore, had to be abandoned. N.Z.

A party of skiers were overwhelmed by an avalanche on Saturday last in the neighbourhood of the Saentis. The party, consisting of seven Swiss, had set out and were about 7,000 feet up when the avalanche descended on them. They were completely buried, but four managed to struggle out and their calls for help were heard by other groups of skiers who worked feverishly to save the two men and the woman buried under the snow. But when reached they were dead. The names of the dead are: Miss Rosa Zubler from Krummenau, Messrs. G. Peter and G. Herter, both from Wülflingen. C.N.

##### VALAIS.

The funeral took place on the 19th of December of M. Remy Berra, manager of the branch of the cantonal bank at Monthey, who was foully murdered. Apart from a great part of the population of Monthey, high officials of the cantonal bank and superior army officers, amongst them Colonel Grosseclin, Division commander, followed the coffin. The murdered man held the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in the army. The murderer, who, as reported in our last issue, was arrested, still refuses to divulge the name of his accomplice. T.G.
