INFORMATION SWISS NATIONAL TOURIST OFFICE.

Forwarding of Messages by Telegraph and Telephone through the Train Staff of the Swiss Federal Railways :--The staff of the Swiss Federal Railways on all trains take messages for forwarding by telegraph or telephone. The mes-sage for communication should be written on a slip of paper with the exact address or telephone number, and should be handed to the attendant on the train, who will pass on the message at the next stop. For telegrams the ordinary charges are payable together with a charge of 60 Cts. For messages by telephone, the charge is Fr. 1.50 up to 15 words in Switzerland. This innovation is being extensively utilized by the travelling public.
