SWISS PRESIDENT AS ARBITRATOR.

M. Motta, President of the Swiss Confederation has been asked by the Government of Sweden and Turkey to act as arbritrator, concerning some outstanding disputes between the two countries. M. Motta has accepted to act in this capacity.

100 ALPINE DEATHS THIS YEAR.

Five fatal accidents have occurred in the Alps during the past two days.

On the Belledone range, Dauphinet, three young men from Lyons fell, and two were killed. A German industrialist, Herr Bolle, fell 100 feet on the Kleiner Wellturm, and was killed. A Swiss climber was killed after a fall of 300 feet on the Ebenalp, and a Swiss girl who was gathering flowers in the Rosegy Valley fell and died from her injuries. An accident befell a Geneva party on the Gran Paradiso, and M. de Mirbach was killed.

This brings to 100 the number of persons killed in the Alps since the beginning of the year.

SWISS BANKING FIGURES.

A quarterly statement of the position as at the end of June last, of eight of the principal commercial banks in Switzerland has just been issued. The total assets of the eight institutions are 6,747,516,000 francs. Of this amount 3,054,688,000 francs is represented by savings and fixed deposits and current accounts. Cash is held 3,034,088,000 trans is represented by savings and fixed deposits and current accounts. Cash is held to the extent of 1,076,518,000 francs, while 2,480,359,000 francs is absorbed by advances on current accounts. It is proposed to issue similar statements every three months in future.

SWISS POSTAL ELECTRICS.

One of the largest fleets of electric vehicles on the Continent is that operated by the Swiss Post and Telegraph authorities in Zurich, where a large new General Post Office known as the Sihlpost has recently been erected.

The fleet at present consists of thirty-four vehicles, constructed by the Elektrische Fahrzeuge Gesellschaft, of Oerlikon. Seven of the vehicles are four-wheel 2-ton vans, fitted with 250 amphour batteries, enabling a distance of from 30 to 37½ miles to be run on one charge; ten are 3-tonners, eight of these having 500 amp-hour batteries giving from 50 to 60 miles on one charge and two 350 amp-hour batteries; three are four-wheel tractors capable of hauling trailers with 5-8 ton loads, while the remainder are three-wheel 6-cwt. vans adapted to run about 37½ miles on a single charge of the 200 amp-hour batteries with which charge of the 200 amp-hour batteries with which they are fitted.

The batteries used on the vehicles are mainly of the Swiss-made lead type — although one of the 3-tonners is provided with a 350 amp-hour Exide battery made by the Chloride Electrical Storage Co., Ltd. — and a feature of the installa-tion is that provision has been made for recharging to be automatically performed, it only being necessary for the driver on bringing in his vehicle to connect the charging plug to the battery. The electricity supply in Zurich being alternating, a special a.c. to d.c. convertor room has been equipped by the Brown-Boveri Co., of Baden.

Fleet extensions are contemplated as the battery-charging equipment installed is provided with a total of 62 control boards and charging plugs.

GOLF AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP

GENEVA.

The heat-wave which has continued in Switzerland since the beginning of the month was broken at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon by one of the most violent storms in living memory.
