SWISS ARMAMENTS IMPROVED.

Switzerland, on the eve of the Disarmament

Switzerland, on the eve of the Disarmament Conference, has introduced several measures for strengthening her national defence. The Swiss Federal Council has just purchased two fresh mountain batteries, which are soon to be used in the measurements

The Swiss Federal Council has just purchased two fresh mountain batteries, which are soon to be used in the manœuvres. It has further been decided to supply the Swiss troops with gas-masks. The Federal Coun-cil estimates the total cost of this equipment at between £320,000 and £360,000 at par. The ex-penditure is to be spread over a series of years. The Council has also resolved to replace the rifle in present use by a new one four centimetres shorter and costing twelve shillings less apiece. The Swiss delegates to the forthcoming Dis-armament Conference have been in consultation these past few days to consider their plan of cam-paign. It is maintained that the Swiss militia-system is far too peculiar to this country to be brought under the general provisions of a univer-sal agreement between nations. The comparatively high military expenditure for Switzerland is explained by the fact that the Swiss Government grant a much bigger sum than do certain neighbouring Governments for the maintenance and comfort of the individual soldier. The Federal air force is so numerically weak in comparison with some other European countries that it cannot admit of reduction. SWISS IMPORTS.

SWISS IMPORTS.

The Federal Council adopted special measure with regard to the limitation of imports which affect chiefly furniture, woods, silks, ready made wear and hosiery.

Imports are not abolished, but restricted, and articles free of restrictions have to pay increased

duties. The Federal Council does not insist on goods The rederal Council does not mast on goods being marked with the country of origin, but the right is reserved to inquire into the present system and to enforce certificates of origin if necessary. Special measures with regard to Germany were adopted. The measures will enter into force on 5th February

SWISS BANK REPORTS.

For the year ending 1931, the directors of the Crédit Suisse propose to pay a dividend of 8 per cent. on the share capital of 150,000,000 francs. The net profit is returned as 12,968,469f. (1930 — 14,555,323).

SWISS BANK CORPORATION.

Swits BANK CORPORATION. Further evidence of the difficult conditions experienced by banking institutions during the past year is afforded by the preliminary results of the Swiss Bank Corporation, but while net profits again show a decline, the fall is not nearly so severe as that reported a year ago. Net profits at £504,341 are £138,186 lower and the dividend is reduced to 7 per cent., as com-pared with 8 per cent. The allocation to pension fund is maintained at £20,000, while the carry-forward is £20,153 higher at £60,922.

SWISS AVIATOR KILLED

M. Albert Klug, from Basle, left on Thursday M. Albert Klug, from Basle, left on Thursday last, the Aerodrome at Birsfelden, in order to visit his mother in Barcelona. He acted as pilot, and his sister was the only passenger. Near Gandesa, about 150 km. from Barcelona, they encountered thick fog, and in order to avoid same, Klug decided to fly at a lower altitude; but as the country around was very mountainous, he crashed into a rock. The machine caught fire, and both pilot and passenger were burnt to death.

STATE SUBVENTION FOR BERNINA RAILWAY.

The Federal Council has allotted an amount of 15,000f. towards the costs of keeping the Bernina Railway open during the winter.

MLLE. PAYOT'S NEW TITLE. In winning the women's French covered court championship Mlle, Lolette Payot became the first Swiss holder of that title. She is a native of Geneva, and learnt the game on courts near the headquarters of the League of Nations. LOCAL.

ZURICH.

M. Bobst, a former Editor of the communist paper "Kämpfer," has been expelled from the communist party for counter-revolutionary propaganda.

The Silk Weaving firm, Karl Weber, in Win-terthur, has reduced the wages of their staff by 10 per cent.

The death is reported from Zurich of Chief engineer Wilhelm Reitz, at the age of 71. M. Reitz was a member of the Engineer Staff of the firm Escher Wyss & Cie, from 1889-1921.

The old Engineering firm Escher Wyss & Cie, has given notice to all their staff, numbering about 1,500. The newly formed Company, "Escher Wyss Maschinen Gesellschaft," has offered to re-instate all those who agree to a reduction of wages amounting to 15%.

BERNE.

M. Ernest Arni, a notary at Büren a. A. was killed when trying to move a safe from one place to another. The deceased was 48 years of age. * * *

The population of the town of Berne at the end of 1931 amounts to 114,272 inhabitants, or 598 persons more than at the end of 1930.

M. K. Mescher, for many years, Editor in Chief of the "Berner Intelligenzblatt" died in Berne.

LUCERNE.

M. B. Holt, a wealthy American, has left his estate at the Utenberg to the town of Lucerne. He also made a legacy to the town amounting to 500,000f. to be paid after his death.

GLARUS.

The late Colonel Tschudi-Freuler, has left an amount of 185,425f. for charitable institutions. BASLE.

Burglars entered the premises of the "Staat-liche Arbeitslosenkasse" at the Klaraplatz. A safe was forcibly opened, and its contents amounting to 46,000f, were stolen. So far the police have no clues to the intruders.

Frei was born at Wolftinswil (Aargau) in 1870, he was at one time Editor of the "Basler Vorwärts," he was also a member of the Grand Council over which he presided. From 1911-1918 he belonged to the National Council. On retirement from the posi-tion as Editor of the "Vorwärts" he left the socialist party and resigned from all political offices which he held. Since 1919 until his death he was Chairman of the Siedlungsgenossenschaft Freidoref Freidorf.

THURGAU.

The management of the Saurer Works at Arbon announced that from and after the 1st of April, the working hours will be reduced to 44 hours per week, and that a cut of 6.4 per cent. in magne will serve its force. wages will come into force.

ST. GALL.

M. I. Grütter, Manager of the Federal Bank (Banque Fédérale) in St. Gallen, has retired from his post, which he occupied for many years. M. K. Lendenmann has been appointed Manager, and M. E. Schaer has been promoted Sub-Manager.

GRISONS.

Günther Grönhoff, the famous German glider who holds the world's record for the longest



gliding flight, was towed up to Davos in his Fafnir glider on January 19th by the Swiss aviator, Fretz, in his Puss Moth. The glider was released from the towing line soon after the two machines came in sight of Davos, and about half an hour later made a graceful and successful landing on the frozen and snowcovered Davos lake, where the aeroplane had already come to rest. It was the first time a glider had been towed in the Alps, and the altitude of 3,700 metres (just over 12,000 feet) reached on this occasion is believed to be the highest at which a glider has ever yet been towed.
