MUSIC IN SWITZERLAND.

The native tongue of one half of the inhabitants of Switzerland is German; of the remainder, the majority speak French, a strong minority Italian, and a few Romansch. In the circumstances, the culture of the different linguistic sections of the population is, very naturally, strongly influenced by the countries lying adjacent to them and speaking the same language. In fact, so many Swiss composers of note have been styled, or even styled themselves, French or German that doubts are sometimes expressed as to whether a modern Swiss national school of music really exists.

None, however, can deny the existence of distinctively Swiss traditional music from a very early date. St. Gall was a musical centre from the eighth century, and there is still in the library there a MS. containing airs taken down by Notker le Bègue (died 912), which are in many instances similar to, or identical with, strains sung by Swiss mountaineers during the last century. Ludwig Senfl (1492-1555), the famous contrapuntist, was born in Basle, and is said to have made use of Swiss melodies. Collections of Swiss folk songs and carols were published as early as 1533.

The distinctive forms of Swiss folk song are the *Ranz des vaches* and watchmen's songs. The *ranz des vaches* (*Kuhreihen*, *Kuhreigen*) is an air played by Swiss herdsmen on the *alphorn* in June to call the cattle from the valleys to the mountain pastures. The *alphorn* (*alpenhorn*) is a long wooden trumpet from three to eight feet in length. The *ranz des vaches* may probably be most correctly translated as the "Procession of the cows." There is an example of a *ranz des vaches* used by Grétry in his *Guillaume Tell* overture, which is said to have been sent to Queen Anne, in England, and of which she was very fond. Most of these songs can be played on the *alphorn* and are based on a simple chord so that they may not be out of harmony with the mountain echo. The *jodel* is often used in the refrain. The *jodel* may be described as an abrupt change from the chest voice to the falsetto, the vowels being merely vocalised and no words sung. Heard on the mountain side, sung by singers with powerful voices, with a big compass, and accustomed to *jodel* from early youth, jodelling is far more pleasing than examples nearer home or across the Atlantic would warrant us in believing, and the programmes of the Swiss stations are worth hearing in that respect. Another characteristic form of Swiss folk music is the watchman's song. It probably originated in German Switzerland, as the night watch call in Tessin, as Italian-Swiss cantons, is still sung in old German.

In general, Swiss folk song has good harmonic possibilities. The dance-songs have highly-developed rhythms demanding frequent changes of time signature. Many of the Swiss folk songs are lineal descendants of, or have much in common with, the hymns and chorals of Swiss medieval church music and the songs of satire and politics inspired by the religious wars of the fifteenth century and earlier.
