COMMERCIAL RELATIONS WITH RUSSIA.

Once again various industrials in Switzerland have approached the Federal Council, regarding re-establishing commercial relations with the Soviet Republic; they expect, however, that the Swiss Government should guarantee the financial transactions, which clearly shows, that these fiems have but little confidence in the integrity of their prospective customers. In acceeding to the wish of these industrials the Swiss Government would saddle themselves with a heavy responsability towards the country, besides there is no article in the constitution which would sanction or justify such an undertaking. There is but little hope that the Federal Council will entertain such a proposal.

ALPINE ACCIDENTS.

A party of five Swiss ski-runners, three men A party of two Swiss ski-funners, three men and two women, was caught by an avalanche yesterday and buried on the Heidelpass, in Canton St. Gallen. The three men and one woman managed to free themselves, but the other woman, Fraülein Wolber, was killed. On the same day a party of six German ski-runners was caught by an avalanche in the Silvretta region in the Grisons, and one, Herr M. Frank, of Lindau, was bilload.

A 14-year-old boy of Gstaad, who was collecting wild flowers in the mountains above Saanen, fell 100ft. and died soon after.

FRENCH HOARD SWISS NOTES.

During this week there has been an extra-ordinary demand in Paris for Swiss banknotes. Packets of them have been despatched from Switzerland to banks and money-changing offices in France to an extent never known before. The notes for 1,000f., 500f., 100f., and 50f. (£40, £20, £4 and £2 at par) are mostly in demand.

NEW SWISS CONSUL AT HAMBURG.

Prof. Ernest Delaquis from Geneva, has been appointed Swiss Consul in Hamburg.

SWISS STUD HORSES FOR PERSIA.

A consignment of horses from the Federal stud farm at Fribourg has left for Persia.

LOCAL.

ZURICH.

An employee of a large warehouse in Zurich has been arrested for falsifying customs receipts. A preliminary enquiry has shown that an amount of over 200,000f. is involved. It is stated that the firm in question had no knowledge of these fear shelf. fraudulent transactions.

Dr. Maag (democrat) has been elected President of the town council at Zurich. Dr. Gygax (liberal) and Dr. Balsiger (socialist) are the two Vice-Presidents of the council.

A military aeroplane crashed beside the road of Nürendorf to Brütten, the pilot, lieutenant Philipp Collet, and the observer, sub-lieutenant Roth, were killed instantaniously.

Lieutenant Collet hails from Geneva, and leaves a widow and a few months old child. Sub-lieutenant Roth was born at Lucerne in 1909 and is a bachelor. Both officers were attached to the military aerodrome at Dübendorf.

M. Heinrich Baumann-Oertli, senior partner of the well-known steel pen works has died in Rüti. M. Baumann was a member of Parliament (National Council) from 1922-1929.

M. K. Louis, Manager of the Municipal Tramways in Berne, is retiring from his post at the end of next month. M. Louis has been for 38 years in the services of the Municipality, where he enjoyed a great reputation.

Dr. H. Mouttet, head of the cantonal government has been elected a member of the State Council, in succession to the late M. Charmillot.

The Grand Council has elected M. Otto Tschanz as chief prosecutor of the canton of Berne. M. Tschanz has played an important rôle in the famous Riedel murder case.

LUCERNE.

The Grand Council has voted a credit of 100,000f, for the erection of a clinic for consumptives, private donations will also be invited. A further sum of 30,000f, has been promised towards the costs of the celebrations on the occasion of the 600th anniversary of the entry of the canton of Lucerne into the Swiss Confederation, providing the town of Lucerne will vote an equal amount. The costs of the intended pageant are estimated at about 120,000f.

SCHWYZ.

The spinning works of Nuclen in Lachen have closed down, owing to lack of orders, and 50 work hands have been discharged.

Dr. med. Josef Weber has died at Schwyz at the age of 65. Dr. Weber was in 1890 Presi-dent of the Swiss Student Association, he was also a leading personality in Swiss Rifle circles. BASLE.

15 YEARS' WORK OF THE COMMISSION DES SUISSES A L'ETRANGER.

(CONTINUED).

I like to think of the hot discussions we sometimes had in the Council where all the Societies were represented. I am elated with memories of great meetings at Ashburton Hall, at Steinway Hall, at Westminster Hall, not to speak of my lecturing tours to the groups in the provinces, to the universities, to Rotarian and other clubs, at soldiers' hostels and hospitals, to wounded soldiers, to Swiss munition workers at Crayford, at the student's homes, at press meetings.

I know it was useful work, and I hope some was for the permanent good of the Colony. To myself it has been an inspiration and a starting point for work at home on a broader scale. After the visit here in 1918, of Messieurs Baudat, then President of the N.S.H., de Reynold, President of the C.S.E. since 1917, and Dr. Schoop, then Secretary of the N.S.H., it was agreed that the propaganda for the foundation of new groups on the Continent should be directed by the central office in Switzerland, whilst we should write to the Swiss Societies overseas. We brought in 19 groups in the 1st "bag" and 20 in the 2nd year. Then at a meeting at Soleure in 1919, where Mr. Baer and I were present, the S.S.E. was founded, and Mr. de Traz was elected Secretary. In 1920 I was sent on a lecturing tour to France and Italy as a result of which we got the Groups of Florence, Genoa, Milan and Le Håvre.

My work being mostly journalistic, the late

My work being mostly journalistic, the late hours every day began to tell, further development of my work in this country was not likely, and so in 1921 I accepted an offer to return to Switzerland, and at the same time to my old job of

teaching.

When the C.S.E. got both a new President (Dr. Martz) and a new Secretary (Dr. Steuri) in 1921, I was elected a member of the C.S.E. and given two jobs which were considered very hard: the task of finding the money for the S.S.E., and that of bringing about an amalgamation between at least 5 publications to all of which the Swiss abroad were expected to subscribe. The finding of Frs. 50,000 in Switzerland is harder work than it was in this colony. Still I was lucky enough
