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

MADAME DENIS THOMAS. †

We deeply regret to inform our readers of the death of Madame Denis Thomas, wife of the Mayor of Torquay, as the result of a fearful accident which overtook the car of Councillor W. C. Coysh, during its descent of the road leading to Oddicombe Beach.

Madame Thomas, who was a subscriber to our paper, was born in Switzerland, and was the daughter of M. Jean Bobillier. MIle. Bobillier received her early education in the Val de Travers, and on passing the Baccalaureat examination, she proceeded to the University of Neuchâtel, where she graduated as a Licenciée (Bachelor of Arts) and also qualified for the Certificat d'Attitude Pedagogique (Diploma in Education). She did not immediately take up teaching, but went to Dresden to study art for a year, being very fond of all kinds of artistic work, in several branches of which, especially in lace-making, she was exceptionally proficient. Her academic qualifications had never been allowed to lapse into disuse, nevertheless. For many years Madame Thomas has been an examiner in French to the London Chamber of Commerce. MIle. Bobillier came to Torquay about a quarter of a century ago to learn English, and carried on business at the Swiss Cafe for a number of years. Some years later she married Alderman Denis Thomas, as he then was, and when it was known some months ago, that he and his wife were to fulfil the positions of the civic heads of the town they received sheaves of telegrams, letters and notes of congratulation.
