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FEDERAL.

SWITZERLAND AND THE ECONOMIC CONFERENCE.

The Federal Council has now chosen the delegates for the World Economic Conference which will start on the 12th inst. in London.

They are: Dr. Schulthess, President of the Swiss Confederation, as head of the delegation; M. Stucki, Ministry of Commerce; Professor Bachmann, President of the Board of the National Bank; Professor Dr. Laur; Dr. Sarasin, National Bank; Dr. Dapples, General Manager of Nestlé's; National Councillor Dr. Wetter. The delegation will be accompanied by the following experts and substitutes: Dr. Bindschedler, Swiss delegate on the German Debt. Committee, M. Golay, General Manager Swiss Bank Corporation, Dr. Homberger of the "Schweiz. Handels und Industrieverein" M. Jaberg, Bank Manager, Zurich; State Councillor Porchet, Lausanne.

At a meeting which took place between the Federal Council and the delegates it was decided that Switzerland should remain on the gold standard and should adhere to the tariff truce.

CIVIL SERVANTS' SALARIES.

The referendum on the proposal to reduce Swiss Government salaries has been lost by a majority of 93,877. The law was rejected by fourteen cantons to 11 and by 502,953 to 409,076 votes. The detailed results are as follows:—

DIPLOMATIC NEWS.

Monsieur Euthymios Kanellopoulos, Greek Minister in Berne, has died after a short illness; he was accredited to the Swiss Confederation since November 1930. M. Kanellopoulos was at one time a member of the Greek Cabinet and from 1923-30 he was Greek Minister at Berlin, for reasons of health he exchanged his post with that of Berne.

LOCAL.

ZURICH.

A communist named J. Hörmann, aged 20, fired 6 shots at a policeman who required his identity papers, fortunately without hitting him. At his domicile a number of rifles and other weapons were found.

BERNE.

The death occurred in Berne of M. Ernst Dick, Founder and Senior Partner of the "Uniformenfabrik Ernst Dick A. G.," at the age of 59.

BASLE.

Dr. Scheuring, editor of the "Rorschacher Zeitung" has been appointed editor in chief of the "Basler Volksblatt" in succession to M. Gustav Schwarz.

The late M. L. Dietrich-Böhme has left a legacy to the canton of Basle amounting to 400,000 frs., the interest of which is to be used to enable poor children to have holidays.

The proposal of the Grand Council to increase the subvention of the Municipal Theatre at Basle from 400,000 to 450,000fr. has been accepted by the electorate by 18,819 against 16,133.

In consequence of an action for defamation of character brought against M. Robert Krebs, editor of the "Vorwärts" by M. Ludwig, head of the cantonal police Dept., the former was condemned to two weeks imprisonment and publication of the verdict.

GENEVA.

The "Quai des Eaux-Vivres" at Geneva will be in future be known as the "Quai Gustave Ador."

ST. GALLEN.

Dr. A. Saxer has been elected member of the National Council, in succession to M. Pestalozzi who has recently died.

VAUD.

From Lausanne comes the news of the death of Dr. Virgile Rossel at the age of 77. Dr. Rossel was from 1912-1933 a member of the Federal Tribunal.

The death is reported from Lausanne of M. Emile Béranger, for the last 17 years pastor at the cantonal hospital, previously he was during 25 years pastor at Mézières. Pastor Béranger, was one of the promoters of the "Théâtre du Jorat," and the father of M. J. Béranger, manager of the "Théâtre Municipal" at Lausanne.

This event was followed by the Veterans' 440 yds. Walking Handicap, which was won by Mr. E. Oggier.
