The Academy is opening its autumn season with a film in German from the Zotis — Sascha Studios in Vienna which is entitled Episode.

Paula Wessely, who will be remembered for her wonderful success in "Maskerade" plays the principal part and Carl Ludwig Diehl who plays opposite her, is one of the best character actors in Austria.

The story is laid in Vienna during the postwar period, and is a complete change from those films about Viennese life to which we have been so accustomed and of which we have perhaps seen too many.

It deals with the adventures of a young lady, or is supposed not to be a young lady, and yet is a young lady, and in spite of all her troubles due to the social upheaval which took place in Central Europe during this period, the story ends happily, as all nice stories should end.

Paula Wessely takes the part of Valerie Gartner, an art student, whose mother has been ruined by the misdeeds of her banker.

In order to keep the news from her mother, Valerie endeavours to make money by selling some of her works of art. She meets a wealthy connoisseur Torresani, who takes an interest in her and helps hem her and helps her.

Torresani has engaged an ex-officer Kinz played by Carl Diehl to act as tutor to his two boys.

Valerie has a friend Mizzi who is as frivolous Valerie is serious. 38

Mizzi manages to involve Valerie in all sorts of trouble, and Kinz who falls in love with Valerie imagines that she is not worthy of his love

This, of course, leads to various complica-tions but in the end, thanks to the intervention of Torresani's wife all ends well.

This film is well worth a visit. The photo-graphy is excellent and the acting is of that high standard which we are accustomed to expect from actors.
