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#### THE STOCK EXCHANGE OF ZURICH. (By Leu & Co's Bank Limited, Zurich)

Zurich, 5th November, 1935.

During the month of October no improvement in the general situation of the stock exchange business was noticeable. On the contrary change business was noticeable. On the contrary the index number of all shares as well as the turnovers were on the decreasing side, proving again that this decline was less the result of abundant selling than the absence of ready buying. In the early part of the past month when the Italian troops commenced marching into Abyssinia the general reaction was a severe setback of all stocks and bonds with interests in Italy. Also other stocks that had but indirect connections with these two countries, dropped considerably. Later on when the League of Nations took charge of the situation and when the conflict could be localised upon the African Continent, people overcame their pessimism to a the conflict could be localised upon the African Continent ,people overcame their pessimism to a certain degree and an inconsistent rise was led by those securities that might possibly benefit from a war or at least not be hampered by it. Nevertheless business-activity remained small and not even the New York markets that showed a favourable disposition most of the time nor the improvement in the prices of certain raw-materials were able to disperse the general ethangy. Amongst the stocks that fluctuated most were Motor-Columbus 137-125-137-125-131, Italo-Suisse quoted 67-61-70-60-68. Others like Indelec, after a drop of 35 francs rose steadily Italo-Suisse quoted 67-61-70-60-68. Others like Indelec, after a drop of 35 francs rose steadily up to nearly 300, while Electrobank improved from 315, its lowest, to 357. The South-American electric shares such as Hispano sold once for 840 and Italo-Argentina for 99. Later on, however, this decrease proved to be unjustified and prices advanced to 880 resp. 117 with a slight downward correction of recent date. Directly influenced by the firm markets for oil shares, Royal Dutch sold for 420 against 381 at the beginning of October. for 430 against 381 at the beginning of October, while American railways showed much trading for 430 against 381 at the beginning of occases, while American railways showed much trading and reasonable improvement. Also Swiss industrials, for instance Aluminium touched bottom-prices for a while, namely 1390 against 1520 at the end of September and 1500 at the beginning of November. Nestlé for a long time most stable, gave way and was traded at 774, a price that was last paid for in February of this year. Occasionally the 800 francs mark was reached again but the present notations are slightly below that. Other industries such as Brown Boverie, Lonza, Kraftwerk Laufenburg, Centralkraft, Vereinigte Luzener Brauereien etc., were quiet and while one or the other might have improved at times, the general tendency was downwards. Bank and isnurance stock viewed little interest, especially trading did not take place. the former ones. For the trading did not take place.

The situation with the Swiss gilt-edged bonds underwent practically no change, the average yield being still close to 5%. It is, however, to be said, that since the definite constellation of the newly elected National Council is known, a more hopeful undertone is noticeable is known, a more noperful undertone is noticeable to the benefit of the Federal bonds. However, conditions are far from satisfactory and new money for governmental purposes is obtained only with great difficulty, not to speak of certain Swiss cities whose efforts to raise funds showed no results.

Contrary to the Swiss bonds that were little Contrary to the Swiss bonds that were little affected by the tense international atmosphere, foreign securities, especially Italian ones lost ground and reached low prices, namely 7% Soc. Meridionale 26%, 6½ sip. 28%. Also 5% Littoral quoted as low as 74%. The belief however that no European complication will result from the Italo-Ethiopian conflict made them gain back part of their lost ground.

### ARMS OF APPENZELL.



Argent, a bear erect sable, langued and armed Gules.

The Canton, once dependent on the Abbey of St. Gall, won its independence after a struggle, and joined the twelve old cantons in 1513.

The arms of Appenzell are, with trifling variations, much alike those of the Abbey and town of St. Gall, and of several neighbouring localities, all tracing their origin to the vassalage of the Abbey of St. Gall.

With the division of Appenzell into the half-cantons of Inner Rhoden and Outer Rhoden in 1597, the old arms of Appenzell were kept and borne by each State except that the bear of Outer Rhoden was flanked with the Latin characters V and R, initial letters of the words *Usser Rhoden*, spelt according to ancient orthography and Swiss pronounciation.

Unlike the impaled arms of Unterwalden and Basle, the arms of each half-canton were not marshalled side by side on one single escutcheon on account of their complete analogy.
