THE SWISS FRANC.

The Swiss National Bank has issued a state The Swiss National Bank has issued a statement drawing attention to the "extraordinarily strong" position of the Note Institute.

Notes and short-term obligations are still covered by gold to the extent of 85 per cent., this being an even higher percentage of gold recovered.

being an even higher percentage of gold reserves than is the case with the Bank of France, where the percentage is 80.

The outflow of capital has, it is true, says the Bank, resulted since the end of March last in a reduction of the gold stocks by some 440,000,000 Swiss francs.

"This occurrence in no wise gives any ground This occurrence in no wise gives any ground for uneasiness, for just as in earlier years gold stocks increased in consequence of the inflow of capital, so now, owing to the outflow of capital, they have shrunk again. The outflow of gold at bottom therefore means a strengthening of Switzerland's currency position in that her floating liabilities to foreign countries are thus substantially reduced.

"There is not the slightest ground for the uneasiness and the mistrust of the Swiss franc which is being spread in a tendencious manner from certain foreign centres."

MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR MARSHALL PILSUDSKI.

A memorial service was held at the "Drei-faltigkeitskirche" in Berne for the late Marshall Pilsudski. The Swiss Government was represented by M. Minger, President of the Swiss Confederation, and Federal Councillors Motta, Baumann and Etter.

Delegations of the two Federal Chambers and the Bernese Government were also present.

RETIREMENT OF COLONEL HIRSCHBUEHL.

Colonel Hirschbühl, for twenty-five years in the service of the Swiss Guard at the Vatican, and since 1921 its commander, has retired from his post. He is succeeded by Lieutenant-Coloneld & Sury d'Aspermont. Cardinal Pacelli, State-Secretary has addressed to the retiring commander a letter of appreciation for the faithful services rendered. vices rendered.

CONSUL FAZER +

M. G. Fazer, Swiss Consul General, has died at Helsingfors at the age of 46; the deceased has represented our country in Finland since 1927.

IMPROVEMENT IN WATCH INDUSTRY.

Among the branches of Swiss industry whose situation seems to have improved, watchmaking takes the lead. Its exports in 1934 exceeded by more than 11 million Francs those of 1933. This industry has vigorously pursued its policy of readaptation to new conditions, both in regard to arrangements between factories and methods of exports.

BERNE.

The Jungfrau railway announces that the 18th annual Summer Ski races on the Jungfrau-joch will take place on July 13 and 14 next. A short trip of three hours takes visitors from Intershort trip of three hours takes visitors from Interlaken to this far famed roof of Europe, 11,340 feet a/s, where ski-ing and dog-sleigh riding are in season all the year round. A most extraordinary attraction is the new crystal hall which guides of the Jungfrau railway have hewn out of the glacier, sixty feet below the surface. A long flight of carefully protected stairs leads to this beautifully sculptured playgound created for the benefit of skaters. The entire Jungfraujoch settlement, which includes the internationally subventioned High Alpine Scientific Institute, is operated by electricity.

LUCERNE.

A second ballot took place in Lucerne for the two remaining seats in the cantonal government. The two liberal candidates Frey and Wismer were elected. The cantonal executive now consists of five Conservatives and two Liberals (No change).

The death is reported from Lucerne of M. Henri Jossi, Manager of the Palace-Hotel d'Axenfels, and Proprietor of the Adler-Kursaal at Adelboden at the age of 41.

Dr. J. Cadish from Praez (Grisons) has been appointed, Professor of Geology at the University of Basle.

M. Gottfried Moser, Director of the "Bürgerspital" in Basle, who was the driver of the motorcar which met with an accident last October, in which M. Aemmer, a member of the cantonal government, M. Goetz, Vice-Director of the "Bürgerspital" and M. Schill, advocate lost their lives, was condemned to 20 days imprisonment and a fine of 1,000 frs for manslaughter. M. Moser was at the time also seriously injured.

Minister Dr. Charles Bourcart has celebrated his 75th birthday anniversary. Mr. Bourcart was from 1915-1925 Minister at Vienna, he was Swiss Minister in London from 1900-1902. M. Bourcart is Hon. Vice-President of the City Swiss Club.

In spite of the decrease in imports, traffic of the inland port of Basle has reached a new record. Thus the turn-over for 1934 reached 1,897,000 tons, compared with 1,695,000 tons in 1933.

The 1934 Accounts of the canton, Basle-County show a debit balance of 169,756.35 frs. (Deficit in 1933: 316,543.60 frs.)


