For the benefit of prespective winter sports enthusiasts as well as those, who for reasons of health need a change of climate, I can highly recommend the





All the Italian frontier on our far right is prohibited area up to the Brenner Pass which, over the innumerable peaks and snowfields, we reach at long last, enjoying a good look as this much discussed gap, about 5,000ft. high, in the Alps. On our left, thousands of feet below in the Inn Valley, I descry Innsbruck. The picture is magnificent. Innsbruck has an aerodrome and thus offers us what is probably the only inviting landing-place noted during our flight. But we are much too interested in the scenery of the High Alps to land. We return to Belp by the route of the Enga-dine, Arlberg Pass and Lichtenstein, crossing then the Rhine Valley to the left of Coire and the Linthal over Glarus, leaving the great Glärnisch mountain on our left.
