SWISS NATIONAL DAY CELEBRATION AT THE SWISS CHURCH.

The Swiss Colony responded in large number to the invitation to the service of worship in connection with the National Day Celebrations at the Eglise Suisse, Endell Street, on Sunday morning the 29th July. The altar was profusely covered with flowers representing our national colours.

The opening hymn: "Grosser Gott, wir loben Dich." — "Grand Dieu, nous te bénissons", directed our thoughts to Him who in the past has protected our homeland.

Rev. P. Rad chose his text from II. Chronicles 20, which brings out three points which we should take to heart. First King Jehoshaphat had a great God. It is the same omnipotent God whom Calvin knew. We see His power in the majesty of our mountains and no wonder the Psalmist wrote : " I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. Furthermore we have a merciful God, because He revealed Himself in Jesus Christ who is our great Lord We have also a victorious God. and Saviour. In Jesus Christ God gives us the greatest victory, the vic-Where He is, there is victory. He tory over death. gives us strength to live, and victory in death.

After the first part of the service, a violin solo was played with the accompaniment of the organ.

Rev. M. Pradervand mentioned that for the first time after 6 years of war we could unite in the assurance that the dangers of war were over. We thank England. This ordeal made adequate rehearsals difficult, nor did the mood of the people prove responsive in the same way as now to celebrations of this kind.

I cannot end this report without thanking the Organising Committee for the fine team work and their labours, and in singling out a few names I feel I cause no heartburnings amongst their colleagues.
