ONE OF THE "FEW."

As another September comes and goes, one's thoughts turn inevitably to that fateful September in 1940 when a mere handful of gallant young men made history that was to have direct bearing on the future of generations to come. On September 15th we will all pause to salute in their entirety those few who held on, and finally drove back the enemy in the great aerial Battle of Britain.

But while remembering the "few" on the anniversary of the day they shot down 185 German planes, many of our readers will recall one pilot in particular, for on that same date, September 15th, 1940, a young man well loved for his friendliness, wit and humour, died in that aerial battle for his country. He was Pilot Officer Roy A. Marchand, twenty-two year old R.A.F. fighter pilot, son of Mr. and Mrs. René Marchand, of 6, Hayes Road, Bromley, killed in action on September 15th, 1940, on his third flight that day. He had been shot down once before in France, May 1940.

His was a short life, of brief happiness (he had been married only a few months before he met his death) but his deeds in that stirring month of September, 1940, will not go unmarked — for they are already woven into the pattern of the great and colourful history of this Island Fortress.
