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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SWISS Y.M.C.A. LONDON.

July 1946 — June 1947.

On looking back over the activities of another year we are thankful to record considerable improvement over the previous years, due to the influx of Swiss Our meetings, with few exceptions, were well attended, and as the interest grew, we met once a week instead of every fortnight as during the war. On many occasions we have been able to be of service to young men in finding accommodation for them and in giving practical advice. Unfortunately our student members can only stay here about four months, and it often means for us a race against time to reach them.

The main object of our meetings was to present a clear conception of what Jesus Christ means to us, and to show that faith in Him does not only build a strong character, but also stability of mind, which means a good equipment in an age like the present which bristles with difficulties and problems of all kind. We have been led particularly to study the mind of the young man of to-day and have explored avenues of approach. The value of a living faith in Jesus Christ was new to many. The question has often been asked in our midst: "Why does not every young man take an interest in Jesus Christ?" Space is too short to go into the matter fully here, but in many cases we found that there was a preoccupation with professional aspirations which ignored the life of the soul. In other cases there is a great deal of prejudice, of wrong notions about the Christian faith and what it stands Or again there is a lethargical indifference to spiritual things because they cannot be seen and yet are real. But the message of Jesus Christ is addressed to all these classes, but they have to be reached in different ways. In one case it means an adjustment to the true values of life; in the other a willingless to listen to what God offers in His Word, the Bible; or again it might need a crisis in a man's life to make him realise that there is a living God. Although we have witnessed great revivial meetings in London last winter, at the Westminster Central Hall and the Royal Albert Hall, Christian work has become more and more a personal matter, a witness as from man to man, as it was the case with the early Church.

Our Christmas party was held as usual. It was at the same time a reunion for the family members of our married friends.

The writer had the privilege to attend the annual Conference of Old Londoners and Parisians held in Zurich last year, and was very much encouraged by the active testimony given by former members of these Associations. One became deeply impressed by the fact that as the years go by the vision of faith gets clearer and firmer, and this is the best evidence that our faith does not merely rest on doctrine, but also on a living conception of Jesus Christ.

We should like to thank our donors in London and Switzerland for the financial support they have given us, which has enabled us to continue our work. We would ask them to give us anew their wholehearted interest, and to make our cause a matter of prayer, so that the good start we have made may be followed by further success. Let us remember the passage: "Men ought always to pray, and not to faint."
