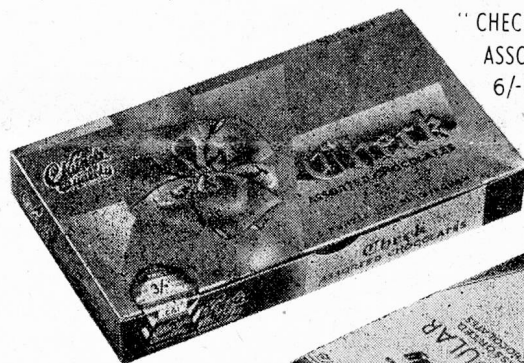
Dear Mr. Stauffer,
