## SPORTS EVENTS.

**Horse Races, Lucerne, (September, 1948).**

A perfect organization had been set up by the racing Club of Lucerne for the traditional horse races. The international participation as well as the performances shown by the horses and riders were magnificent. It was bad luck that rain and unfavourable weather prevented many people from attending the gathering. Only 8,000 people watched the thrilling event instead of an expected crowd of 20,000. The organizing committee suffered therefore serious financial losses.

Here are the results of the various events: 1. Prize of the Swiss Equestrian Association (3000m.): winner: Kiromo (ridden by N. Stadelmann). 2. Prize of Hochdorf (1400m.): winner: Sibonne (ridden by Ramognino). 3. Prize from Sonnenberg (3000m.): winner: Eurycléa (ridden by E. Creteigny). 4. Prize of the Hotels of Lucerne (2500m.): winner: Kerlaz (ridden by R. P. Ruff. 5. Prize from Kastanienbaum (3000m.): winner: Regillus (ridden by F. Liechti). 6. Prize of the Casino of Lucerne (2400m.): winner: Sistobel (ridden by Philidor). 7. Prize from Bürgenstock (3500m.): winner: Tcherkassy (ridden by Bottoni). 8. Grand Prix of Lucerne (4200m.): winner: Royal Bouquet (ridden by H. Bleuler).

**Cycling.**

The famous "Grand Prix des Nations" took place in Paris on Sunday, 19th September. All well-known international cyclists were assembled at the start. The Swiss F. Kübler showed a brilliant performance and was leading in this individual time-race during the greater part of the competition. Eventually he finished second to the Frenchman, F. Berton, having covered the distance of 140km. in 3:39 hours. This result is the best ever recorded by a Swiss competitor in this European championship.

The Swiss championship for team racing was organized on the 12th of September by the town of Rheinfelden. 44 teams entered the event; the distance was 101.2 km. and the result of the race was the following: 1. V. C. Oerlikon I, 2:28:25.6 hours (Swiss Team Race Champion). 2. Pédale des Eaux-Vives, Genève, 2:28:28.4 hours. 3. V. C. An der Sihl Zürich, 2:29:53 hours.

**Gymnastics.**

The members of the Swiss Olympic Team gave a propaganda performance at Lugano on 12th September. The competition was won by J. Stalder, Lucerne, from Walter Lehmann, Richterswil, and Karl Frei, Regensdorf. This Lugano competition served equally as basis for the nomination of the team-members, who are called upon to represent Switzerland against Finland. This Swiss-Finnish gymnastic meeting will take place toward the end of September in Helsinki. The Swiss team will consist of J. Stalder, Walter Lehmann, Fritz Lehmann, Karl Frei, Tschabolt Adatte, Bach, Thalman.

**Football.**

An international game between Luxembourg and Switzerland B has been played at Luxembourg on Sunday, 19th September. Switzerland won the meeting by the score 2—1, both goals being scored by

Lempen. The critics described the game as a poor show of football with the defences on either side being particularly weak.
