OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES.

St. Moritz.

The games opened at St. Moritz on January 30th in glorious sunshine. The inaugural ceremony of the Vth Olympic Games took place in front of many thousand spectators and the games were opened by the President of the Swiss Confederation, M. Enrico Celio. The Olympic Oath was read by the Swiss Ice Hockey player Torriani in French:

“ Nous jurons que nous nous présentons aux Vme jeux Olympiques d'hivers donnés à St. Moritz à l'occasion de la XIVe Olympiade en concurrents loyaux des réglemens qui le régissent et désireux d'y participer dans un esprit chevaleresque pour l'honneur de nos pays et la gloire du sport.”

The opening of the games was accompanied by a very regrettable incident *i.e.* the International Olympic Committee decided to exclude the Ice Hockey Tournament from the Olympic Games owing to the dispute between the two American teams A.A.U. and A.H.A. It was added that the International Ice Hockey Federation was no longer recognized by the International Olympic Committee as the controlling authority for international ice hockey. As the Swiss authorities did not agree with this decision, they were threatened with exclusion from the London Olympic Summer Games. They nevertheless proceeded to see the programme through as originally organised. Fortunately the International Olympic Committee changed their mind and issued a bulletin at the end of the games to the effect that the tournament concluded in the meantime is recognized as an Olympic event and that the winners

receive the gold, silver and bronze medals with the exception of the American Amateur Ice Hockey Association team which competed in the games, who should be regarded as outside the competition. Thus ended a most unfortunate and unnecessary dispute.
