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## LECTURE OF DR. H. CLAVADETSCHER.

If ever a forthcoming event inside the Swiss Colony has deserved some advance publicity, it undoubtedly is the Lecture, which Dr. H. Clavadetscher will give at the lecture hall of the Royal Society of Arts, John Adam Street, Adelphi, on Wednesday, October 18th, at 7 p.m.

Dr. Clavadetscher, who hails from the Grisons and makes his living as a medical practitioner at Le Locle, is perhaps one of the finest alpinists as well as nature lovers at present active in Switzerland. There is hardly a "Fourthousander", i.e. a peak over 4,000 metres high, which Dr. Clavadetscher has not climbed. There is hardly an alpine flower or animal, which he does not know intimately and which he has not studied. During 15 years of his wanderings and meanderings across the mountains and through the valleys of our native country, he has photographed nature and people at various angles. His collection of beautifully coloured lantern slides, which he will show in London, is easily one of the finest that can be seen anywhere.

I have seen and heard Dr. Clavadetscher more than once while on holidays in the Engadine. I would not describe his slides in such glowing terms if such a description were not fully deserved.

It is often said, and rightly said, that a lecturer is a man who gets up to say that he does not intend to keep the audience for long. He then produces a manuscript about as thick as a London telephone directory and proceeds to read therefrom until the last member of the audience has either left, or gone asleep or has developed cramp from yawning. I can assure all readers of this little note that Dr. Clavadetscher is not that type of lecturer at all and that a real treat is in store for all members of the N.S.H., the Anglo-Swiss Society or the Colony at large who care to turn up at John Adam Street on Wednesday, October 18th.
