When speaking of the "Entente Cordiale" one invariably has in mind the Entente between this country and France, the instigator of which was the late King Edward the VII; but there has existed an "Entente" between Great Britain and our country, which, although not officially documented, nor of a specifically political nature, dates back several centuries and is, and has been, no less cordial than the one just mentioned.

The two countries, which have much in common, have never met against each other on the battle fields, but Swiss Regiments have fought gallantly side by side with the British in many theatres of war; true enough they have been duly paid for doing so, and the saying: "pas d'argent, pas des Suisses" at one time bardly enhanced our reputation. This, however, is ancient history, and as a mitigating fact it might be said, that whosoever sought the help of our soldiers got their "money's worth."

As time went on, there sprung up between Great Britain and the Helvetic Republic a, what one might call, "Entente de cœur", based on mutual respect for each others institutions, achievements and aims, which rests on a much sounder foundation than mere poli-


tical treaties, which, as history has taught us, are easily upset.

To fortify and still further improve these relations, the Anglo-Swiss Society was founded some two years ago; the need was felt, that by meeting each other more often in the social sphere, an even closer association could be fostered, and I can say, without any reserve, that the aims of this young, but active Society, have so far, fully justified its existence.

Apart from the social functions, like banquets, luncheons and dances, lectures are given by prominent men of both countries on various subjects and in different spheres which add greatly to a more intimate knowledge of the two countries.

A striking example of this "Entente de cœur" was the Xmas Banquet and Ball, which took place on Monday, December 11th, at the Dorchester Hotel, Park Lane, W.1, under the Presidency of the Rt. Hon. Philip Noel-Baker, P.C., M.P., a member of H.M.'s Government.

Nearly 300 persons of both nationalities attended this festival which was a most enjoyable and intimate affair. If this evening was a success, it was principally due to the efficient arrangements which were made by

As mentioned in one of my recent reports, Banquets and Balls are much of a muchness nowadays, this Banquet, however, distinguished itself from the purely Swiss functions, by the fact, that, apart from the customary loyal toasts, no speeches were inflicted upon the revellers, not that I would advocate dispensing with speeches altogether, it has been my privilege to listen to many delightful after dinner speeches, but others were less amusing, and not a few were, the least said, trying.

Before the dinner a reception was held by the President of the Society, and the Swiss Minister accompanied by their Ladies, after which the company adjourned to the richly decorated Ball room of the

Dorchester.

A huge Xmas tree reminded the company, that the festival of peace and goodwill was on hand, and the various cantonal flags exhibited on the tables added

to the "Stimmung."

The dinner too bore a festive character, consisting of roast turkey and Xmas pudding, which are so intimately connected with this time of the year. Excellent vintages from the sun-kissed vinyards of our country were served and thus evoked in many of the company pleasant memories of recent holidays spent in Switzerland.

A festival of this kind would be incomplete without the Ladies, their gay laughter and radiant beauty

were one of the features of the evening.

An excellent cabaret was provided for, but the clou of the evening was, when a huge cake, depicting the "Matterhorn" was brought in to the music of Mr. Gandon's accordion band. Dancing went on with remarkable perseverance until midnight, when this most successful festival came to a close.
