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"TOO DANGEROUS " SPORT IS BACK AT ST. MORITZ.

Horse racing on the frozen lake of St. Moritz in Switzerland, which is being held last month for the first time since 1939, is a sport which was once laughed off as impractical.

When the suggestion was first made at the beginning of the century it was dismissed as impossible and even dangerous. It was only seriously considered when scientists called in to test the strength and thickness of the ice assured the authorities that it would easily bear the weight of half a million people.

The first actual trials consisted of trotting and skikjöring races, which had previously taken place in the streets of St. Moritz.

The town was already one of the most famous winter sports resorts in the world when the decision was finally taken to mark out a course 15 miles long and 150 feet wide on the lake.

Soon the races became international fashion events, taking an essential place in the St. Moritz season of ski-ing, skating, tobogganing and ice hockey — and, of course, the thrilling three-quarters-of-a-milelong Cresta Run.

They came to a standstill during both world wars, and the last Grand Prix of St. Moritz took place in 1939.

Last month's 29th international race meeting included flat racing, trotting and skikjöring.
