The Swiss rescue society has decided to form an air rescue guard and is organizing parachute squads. Already over 20 young surgeons have volunteered to undergo training for a licence.


The nationalisation of the Berne-Loetschberg-Simplon Railway is to be discussed in the next session of Parliament. It is expected that the talks will be conclusive, and that the absorption of the Loetschberg Railway by the Federal Railways will take place in a year or two. A difficulty is said to be that the Loetschberg Railway opposes the alleged wish of the Federal

Railways to take over only the main line of the Loetschberg (the Spiez-Loetschberg-Brigue section), leaving the adjoining or secondary lines to the Loetschberg and its associates. The Loetschberg Railway is said to favour only complete nationalisation, first because its main line is the only paying section of the system which, deprived of it, would be left with its non-paying lines only, and secondly, these secondary lines would lose their workshops, which are situated on the main line.

Sir William P. Hildred, Director General of the International Air Transport Association, has announced in Montreal that the annual meeting of the organisation will take place in Geneva at the Palais du Conseil Général from September 15th to 19th, 1952. Heads of 62 airlines from 40 different countries are to take part in the assembly to which many Swiss and International Organisations are to send observers. Dr. Walter Berchtold, Managing Director of Swissair, is to take over as President of I.A.T.A. for 1952/53 at the opening ceremony.

Verdi's "Le Troubadour" and the "Samson and Delilah" of Saint-Saëns will be the highlights of the "Festival of Berne, 1952" which the Swiss capital is presenting this year from June 25th—29th. International famed artists are to take part in the programme, as well as the orchestra and choir from the theatre "La Fenice" in Venice and a ballet troupe from La Scala in Milan. The acoustics of Berne's Festival Hall have been judged excellent for the presentations. Two years ago, Berne was the scene of two fine performances of Verdi's "Aida" and "La Forca del Destino" which were highly successful. Further details can be obtained from the Festival Secretariat, 41, Junkerngasse, Berne, Switzerland.

The people in the region of the Lower Engadin will celebrate this Summer the 300th anniversary of the acquisition of its freedom from Austria. The official celebration will take place at Bad Scuol-Tarasp-Vulpera on June 22nd, 1952. The morning is reserved for the reception of the guests and the official ceremonial act, whereas in the afternoon the main procession "The Lower Engadin 300 years ago and to-day" with 700 participants will take place. The festival play "La Changun da la liberta" (The song of freedom) by Men Rauch will be presented on the typical Engadin village square, the "Bügl grond" in lower Schuls. The open-air display will be staged every fortnight until the end of August.
