Monsieur Jean-Marie Musy, a former Federal-Councillor, has died at the Cantonal Hospital, Fribourg.

He was born on January 10, 1876, at Albeuve (Ct. Fribourg); on finishing his schooling he studied law at the Universities of Fribourg, Munich and Berlin, and

practised for several years as a lawyer. Later on, Monsieur Musy was appointed Manager of the "Crédit Gruyérien" in Bulle. From 1912-1919, he was a member of the Government of the canton Fribourg.

Monsieur Musy entered the Federal Government in 1919 as head of the Finance and Customs Department. He retired in 1934 after having twice been President of the Swiss Confederation (1925 and 1930).

Monsieur Max Grässli, Swiss Minister to Hungary, has been appointed Swiss Minister to India and Thailand, in succession to Minister Armin Daeniker, who has been transferred to Sweden.

Minister Grässli was born at St. Gall in 1902, and is a citizen of Grabs (St. Gall). He studied *juris prudencia* at the Universities of Geneva, Paris and Berne, afterwards practising as a lawyer in Berne, Aarau and Geneva. In 1930, he entered the Diplomatic Service and was attached to the Swiss Legation in Paris. Three years later (1934), Monsieur Grässli returned to Berne and was promoted to Secretary of Legation. In 1936, he was sent to Berlin, which post he left in 1942 on his appointment as Consul General in Bratislava. In 1945, he was promoted to the rank of Counsellor of Legation and transferred to Washington, which post he occupied until 1948, when he was sent on a diplomatic mission to Japan. After a few months, Minister Grässli returned to Berne. From May 25th to September 22nd, 1948, he was Chargé d'Affaires in Moscow and the following year he was appointed Swiss Minister to Hungary.

The Swiss Federal Railways have carried 17.40 million passengers during March, 1952, or 446,000 less than in March, 1951. Receipts from passenger service are returned as 22.79 million francs (March, 1951: 23.91 million francs).

Goods traffic has diminished by 164,000 tons, and is returned as 1.58 million tons carried. Receipts thereof amount to 30.33 million francs (March, 1951: 31.24 million francs).

The Obwaldner "Landsgemeinde" was held at Sarnen, and attended by the following guests: Federal-Councillor Dr. Ph. Etter, States Councillor E. Speiser and National Councillor R. Grimm. Dr. G. Odermatt, National Councillor, was again elected "Landammann". Mr. L. von Moos, States Councillor, has been appointed to the office of "Landesstatthalter".

In 1948, at the Olympic Games in St. Moritz, he was first in the "Patrouillenlauf" and at the Olympic Games at Oslo his patrol won the European championship. In 1947, Robert Zurbriggen was Swiss champion in the 18 and 50 kilometer race.

Charles Girardet, in Montreux, at the age of 67. The deceased was a member of the Boards of the following companies: Leukerbad Railway, Electricity Works, Dala, "Hotel and Bädergesellschaft Leukerbad", Aigle-Le Sépey-Diablerets Railway and Martigny-Orsières Railway. In the army, he reached the rank of Colonel of artillery.

Melchoir Weber-Diebold, "Bezirksammann", and for many years a member of the "Kantonsrat" Schwyz, in Schwyz, aged 72.

Kurt Meyer, since 1932 Professor of organic chemistry at the University of Geneva, in Geneva, at the age of 59.

Arthur Piaget, for 40 years Professor of Philology at the University of Neuchâtel, and from 1898-1935, keeper of the archives of the canton Neuchâtel, in Neuchâtel, aged 86.

William Mattly-Claudet, a lawyer and journalist and a former member of the editorial staff of the "Tribune de Genève", in Geneva, at the age of 70.

Dr. Alfred Ursprung, since 1903, Professor of Botany at the University of Fribourg, in Fribourg.

Anton Gwerder-Betschart, for many years President of the commune of Muotatal, and a member of the "Kantonsrat" Schwyz, at Muotatal, aged 78.

Henri Darbre, at one time station-master at La-Chaux-de-Fonds, sub-inspector in Geneva and from

1923-1933, Traffic inspector in Geneva, at Lausanne, aged 86. The deceased was elected a member of the Board of the Swiss Federal Railways in 1919.

Rudolf Heuberger, consulting-engineer; the new railway station at Bienne was built after his plans.

Adolf Furrer, engineer-in-chief of the "Dampfschiff-Gesellschaft des Vierwaldstättersees" in Lucerne.

Dr. Richard Iklé, a lawyer, well-known in Banking and industrial circles, in St. Gall, at the age of 70.

Emil Spiess, Hotelier and President of the commune of St. Moritz, in Lugano, aged 84.

Iginio Franscini, from 1947-1951, a judge of the Riviera district (Ct. Ticino), in Zurich, at the age of 34.

Dr. Robert Löliger-Geiser, from 1923-1943, Central Secretary of the "Stiftung Pro Juventute", in Zurich, aged 66.

Mme. A. H. Mercier-Jenny, for the last twelve years Central President of the "Schweiz. Gemeinnützigen Frauenvereins", in Glarus, at the age of 67.

Colonel Emile Villeneuve, industrialist, in Malleray-Revilard, at the age of 62. The deceased was in command of the 9th regiment and the 3rd Brigade, during the last war. [A.T.S.]

Dr. Max Wey (60) Mayor of the town of Lucerne. Dr. Wey was a member of the government of the canton of Lucerne from 1921-1927. In 1927, he was appointed Director of municipal enterprises, which post he held until 1939, when he was elected Mayor of the town of Lucerne. Since 1931, he has been a member of the Grand Council and since 1935 of the National

Council over which he presided in 1946/47. From 1941-1948, Dr. Wey was President of the Swiss Liberal-Democratic Party.

Pierre Grellet (70), Journalist and author, who, for over 40 years has been in the service of the "Gazette de Lausanne".

Jakob Meili (80), a member of the National Council from 1920-1942, and the "Kantonsrat" of Thurgau, and for many years a secretary of the Swiss Farmers Union.

Hans Berger (70), well-known painter, in Solothurn.

Dr. Armin Meili (60), National-Councillor, Director of the "Landesaustellung 1939" Zurich, and a *doctor honoris causa* of the University of Zurich. He is the President of the "Schweizerischen Vereinigung für Landesplanung." [A.T.S.]
