Monsieur A. M. Malik, the newly appointed ambassador of Pakistan, has presented his credentials to Mon-

sieur Max Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation. He was formerly Minister of Labour in the Pakistan cabinet.

He was a Professor at the University of Geneva, and author of a number of works, amongst them "L'avènement de la démocratie suisse" (1918), "Le contrôle de la politique étrangère" (1924) and "Regards vers la paix" (1942). Canon Nicolas Peissard, for 25 years archaeologist of the canton of Fribourg, and Director of the arthistorical museum, Fribourg. The University of Fribourg honoured him with the degree of doctor honoris causa, in Fribourg, at the age of 81.

Carlo Mondada, Head of the Secretariate for Italian language at the Federal Chancery in Berne, in Berne, aged 43.

Jules Hagmann, since 1929, a member of the Grand Council of the canton of Basle Town, at the age of 60.

Dr. phil. Eduard Korrodi, from 1915-1950, Literary Editor of the "Neuen Zürcher Zeitung", Zurich, in Zurich, aged 70.

ANNIVERSARIES.

Ernst Müller (70) of Schaffhausen, Vice-President, and a member of the Board of the Georg Fischer, A.G., Schaffhausen. He has rendered eminent service to our country during the last war as Head of the "Sektion für Eisen und Maschinen des Kriegsindustrie-und Arbeitamtes". The "Jubilar" is a member of the Swiss Chamber of Commerce, and the committee of the "Arbeitgeberverbandes Schweizerischer Maschinen und Metall Industrieller'.

Henri Favre-Leuba (90) of Zurich. Born at Le Locle, but for the last 60 years living in Zurich, he is the proprietor, together with his brother, of the "Baumaterialenfabrik Favre & Cie, Wallisellen, and a co-founder of the "Kanderkies, A.G.", Favre is a member of the Board of several manufacturing concerns in Western Switzerland.

Professor Heinrich Hanselmann (70) of Zurich, founder and head of the "Landeserziehungsheim Albisbrunn" and the "Heilpädogogischen Seminars", Zurich, and since 1931, Professor for "Heilpädogogik" at the University of Zurich. He is the author of a great number of works.

Dr. Paul Meierhans (60) of Zurich, a member of the Government of the canton of Zurich. Before entering the cantonal Government he held the post of Editor-in-Chief of the "Volksrecht", Zurich; he sat in Parliament (National Council) for several years.


Professor, Dr. August Simonius (70) of Basle, Professor for "Römisches Recht and Privatrecht" at the University of Basle, for over 35 years. Several Universities both at home and abroad have honoured him with the degree of doctor honoris causa.

Professor Dr. med. and Dr. theol. h.c. Walter Gut (70), of Zurich. The "Jubilar" was from 1918-1923, physician at the "Nervenheilanstalt" Honegg-Meilen. In 1923, he was appointed Professor at the Theological Faculty of the University of Zurich. The University of Marburg honoured him with the degree of doctor honoris causa.

A British military mission now in Berne to advise Swiss armoured forces on the use of the hundred British Centurion tanks recently bought by Switzerland, is led by Lieut.-Col. A. C. J. Wimbush, of the Royal Tank Regiment, who until the end of last year was on the staff at Lulworth. He was subsequently posted to the Experimental Station at Chobham.

Another member of the mission is Capt. Muggleton, who is one the instructors at Bovington, but has been detached temporarily for the visit to Switzerland.

The Swiss marksman, E. Schmidt, broke the world record by one point when he won the individual rifle



shooting title on the first day of the European shoot-

ing championships in Bucharest.

His winning total was 531 points. Russia won the team rifle shooting title with 2633 points, 27 more than the world record. Switzerland, the world title holders, were second with 2630.

The Edmonton (U.S.A.) city council has approved the purchase from the Swiss firm of Brown Boveri of two gas turbine generators for its power house. They are described as the largest of their kind in the world, and will cost \$2,878,000.

Mrs. Roosevelt and the Queen of the Netherlands, at an impressive ceremony in the council chamber of the Palais des Nations (Geneva), were presented with the Nansen Medal for 1954 and 1955 respectively for their services in the cause of refugees. Mrs. Roosevelt received the award in person, and Baron Bentinck, the Netherlands Minister to Switzerland, accepted it on behalf of Queen Juliana.

The occasion — as Mr. A. Pelt, director of the European office of the United Nations, said in his closing words — was presided over by the spirit of Fridtjof Nansen, whose portrait by Axel Revold formed an appropriate background to the scene, and to whose personality and work as the League of Nations High Commissioner after the First World War many tributes were paid in the course of the proceedings. Mr. Odd Nansen, his son, is a member of the committee which makes the award each year, and he was among the speakers.

In asking Mrs. Roosevelt to accept the medal (which bears Fridtjof Nansen's principle, "Love of man is practical policy", spoken in the same council chamber nearly 30 years ago), Dr. G. J. Heueven van Goedhart, the present High Commissioner for Refugees, referred to her "warm heart for the poor, the have-nots, the under-developed, the oppressed, the uprooted", and to the lifelong "fight for the right of every man to freedom of speech and religion, to freedom from fear and want".

The well-known Swiss composer Ernest Bloch, born in Geneva in 1880, and resident in U.S.A. has recently given a valuable collection of MSS dealing with musical matters to the "Schweiz. Landesbibliothek" in Berne. [A.T.S.]

The centenary was celebrated, at Zermatt, of the opening of Zermatt's first hotel, the Hotel Monte Rosa, begun by Alexander Seiler and still in the hands of the same family. The important part played by British climbers in Zermatt's development was emphasized when the hotel was opened in July, 1855. At one time it was called the Zermatt Alpine Club Rooms. The first British to sign the visitors book in July, 1855, were the brothers Hunter and the brothers Smyth, who on July 31 made the first ascent of Monte Rosa.

Philately.

The Swiss National Exhibition of Philately will be held at Lausanne from October 15th-23rd, 1955. The Aviation Section will be of special interest, the principal European and American Air Transportation Companies all exhibiting displays of their own.

Work on the Furka Road completed.


The Furka road, which had hitherto been classed as a cantonal road, is now an international road. Extensive work had been in progress for some time. The existing road surface has been improved and widened. The completion of this project was celebrated in the presence of nearly 200 guests who, after driving over the road from Brig to the top of the pass, stopped at Gletsch and came down again to Münster for the official ceremony honoured by the presence of Mr. Etter, Federal Councillor, H.E. Monseigneur Adam and Mr. Schnyder, President of the State Council of the Valais.

Aerial Railway to Pilatuskulm.

The Pilatus Railway Company have announced the opening of the new Aerial Railway from Fräkmüntegg to Pilatuskulm for the beginning of December, 1955. In future Mount Pilatus will therefore be accessible not only in summer but in winter too. The cabin cable railway linking Kriens (short tram journey from Lucerne) with Fräkmüntegg is already in operation.

At the Geneva Museum of Art and History.

New works, kindly loaned by a local collector, give added attraction to the halls devoted to French painting of the XIX and XXth centuries. Among the paintings displayed there are several Renoirs — still lifes, flower studies, landscapes and one portrait — as well as works by Picasso, Vlaminck, Othon Friesz and Camoin. Several works of sculpture by Degas and a small bronze by Maillol complete this fine collection



which will be on view to the public during the summer months.

The Ascona Music Weeks.

Until October the 7th, 1955, Ascona will be a centre of attraction for music lovers. The Orchestra of the Italian-speaking Swiss Broadcasting Company will be giving a series of concerts conducted by F. Fricsay, O. Nussio, A. Cluytens, I. Markevitch, Th. Egel and M. Sargent. This music festival began on August 23rd, in the romantic setting of the Isles of Brissago, with a serenade by the Collegium Musicum Elveticum, conducted by R. Schumacher.

The Alpine Museum celebrates its Fiftieth Anniversary.

The Swiss Alpine Club has just celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the foundation of the Alpine Museum at Berne. This museum is unique of its kind. Only those of Turin and Munich resemble it in any way. It displays everything connected either directly or indirectly with the Alps: people and things, ways and customs, maps, geology, fauna and flora, climate, etc.

The 39th Swiss Industries Fair at Bale.

The 39th Swiss Industries Fair, which was held at Bale from April 16th to 26th this year, was attended by some 700,000 visitors. The number of visitors from abroad is estimated to be 30,000, the number of buyers from 70 countries who registered at the reception service being 11,664.

The transactions concluded at the Fair for both

the home and foreign markets bore witness to a confident optimism in the development of the economic situation. There was great foreign demand for watches as well as for the products of the electrical industry, machines in general and machine tools. The textile industry too met with great success in the field of exports, particularly with regard to clothing.

The 40th Bale Fair will be held from April 14th to 24th, 1956.

The Lake of Geneva Museum at Nyon.

A new, very interesting and instructive museum has just been opened at Nyon: it is devoted to the history of the Lake of Geneva — the biggest lake in Western Europe, fed by 289 Alpine glaciers — from the time of the early lake dwellers to the present day. In addition to an interesting chart showing the depths of the lake, a gift of Mr. Jaccard of the Federal Water Supply Department, one may study everything connected with navigation: a wind chart, the climate, tides, electrical phenomena, mirages, sports and even life-saving. The fish, birds, plants and arts of the lake (painting, literature and music) are also included among these collections together with scale models of shallops, sailing boats and steamers.

The Aar gorges lit up.

Electric lighting has just been installed in the Aar gorges, near Meiringen, Bernese Oberland. These gorges, which are about a mile long and have for some sixty years been made accessible to the public by means of tunnels and footbridges, can now also be visited at night.
