

Politics, however, have a great part to play in some other open-air events being held in Appenzell, Hundwil, Stans and Sarnen this month — the Landsgemeinden. These outdoor assemblies at which citizens decide, by a show of hands, how their affairs are to be conducted during the coming year, are typically Swiss. The speeches, full of good sense and often laced with a fair measure of good humour, may be lost on visitors, but few can fail to be impressed by these age-old examples of direct democracy in such grandiose surroundings.

SWISS ENTERS FOR OPEN POLICE BOXING CHAMPIONSHIPS.

For the first time since the Championships were started in 1927, a member of the Swiss Police Force has notified his intention to enter this international tournament. Sepp Suter of Berne Police will take part in the Heavyweight class, the Semi-Finals and Finals of which will be held at The Royal Albert Hall, London, on Monday, 2nd May next. The present holder of the title is W. Engel, Berlin Police. A unique feature of this tournament is that The Crookes Laboratories Ltd., each year provide a highly trained and fully qualified team of physiotherapists and its equipment to treat all competitors. This treatment can take the form of massage and loosening up, or be fully comprehensive in the repair of boxing injuries sustained during a bout. The expert skill of this team has, in past years, enabled a man who received injury in a semi-final to so recover that he has been able to take part in the final and win, as in the cases of J. Trevillion (Metropolitan, 1951), A. Hoyle (Monmouth, 1953) and J. F. Champ (Birmingham, 1951) and others. In no other Amateur Boxing Tournament in this country are such faciliities provided, and not only does it ensure that each competitor enters the ring in excellent physical condition, but also that competitors from overseas police forces can enter the Championships confident in the knowledge that their physical well-being is in the hands of competent and skilled men who have studied the treatment of sports injuries. We hope that Herr Suter will enjoy his visit to this country, and wish him luck in his endeavour to be the first Swiss to win an Open Police Championship.
