Swissair has ordered an additional three Convair Metropolitans for its European network. This brings to eleven the number of Metropolitans the airline has on order.

The three aircraft are scheduled for delivery next year. The first of the original order for eight will arrive in Switzerland early next month and the other seven will follow during the summer. They will operate between the U.K. and Switzerland as from the end of June.

All the Metropolitans will be equipped with storm warning radar and superior sound-proofing.
