# International Festival at Montreux

More than thirty-five nations representing sixty major TV networks are expected to participate in the World's 1st International Festival of Television Arts and Sciences, to be held in Montreux from 15th to 27th May. The twoweek Festival is divided into four parts : 15th to 27th May: a TV equipment trade fair; 17th to 21st May: a technical symposium; 22nd to 27th May : a TV contest of variety and musical shows; 27th May : International "Night of the Stars" presentation.

Famous musical and variety show performers will be featured for the prize-winning award of a Golden Rose and cash prize of S.Fr.10,000. There will be a second and a third prize of silver and bronze roses respectively. Network participation is tailored to meet the requirements of a TV film contest which is one of the highlights of the Festival. The contest is under the official sponsorship of the Swiss Broadcasting Corporation. Entries will be submitted on "sight and sound" tape, kinescope, film, or even on the spot "live shows". Several networks, including one in far-off Persia, have said they will bring a live show to Switzerland to enter the Festival.

Part of the effort the city of Montreux is preparing is a gala and costume atmosphere in the Castle of Chillon immortalized by Lord Byron, where a "Night of the Stars" presentation is to include film and TV personalities now resident in the area.

A TV symposium to be held from 17th to 21st May will bring together top-flight experts in the television world.

\* \* \*

This TV Symposium is being sponsored by the International Telecommunications Union (ITU) and will attract experts from some 100 member nations. The United States and Russia are known to have made the most advances in the space era and will no doubt highlight debate on televising from outer space. The Symposium will include papers to be read on a wide range of subjects. These take in, for example, colour television, future TV arts and sciences, educational TV, studio, filming, videotape and camera technique, role of commercial TV, and space broadcasting.

The trade fair held in conjunction with the Festival is to exhibit the most up-to-date developments in television.
