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### THE "SWISS OBSERVER" THIRTY YEARS AGO

When we look at a copy of the "Swiss Observer" of 2nd July 1932 we find that the format was different, much larger; in fact as wide as it is long today and its length twice today's width, but it consisted of only four pages. It appeared every week and Mr. Stauffer was editing it.

On that day thirty years ago we read about 100 arrests during Communist troubles in Zurich. There was a proud announcement that "Swissair is operating fastest air lines in Europe" with two Lockheed Orion engines, 223 m.p.h. maximum speed and flown at a cruising speed of 161 m.p.h.

In the same copy we also found a report of the 63rd Fête Suisse, at which the Swiss Orchestral Society, the Choral Society and the Gymnastic Society took part — three societies which are now either extinct or dormant.

A week later we read that the Swiss delegation to the League of Nations Session included Federal Councillor G. Motta, Prof. Max Huber and Mr. William Rappard.

There was an interesting report on a Swiss Rally at Whipsnade, in which, through the initiative of Mr. Brun of the Swiss Club Birmingham, a contingent of 150 Swiss from Birmingham, Leicester and Manchester took part. They came by charabancs and cars and we were told that between 450 and 480 tickets were sold for both luncheon and tea at the pavilion. I wonder how big the party would be if we could repeat the venture today?

In the issue of 16th July the retirement of the Swiss Second Chef at Buckingham Palace, Gabriel Tschumi, was announced. He had been working for 34 years in the Royal Kitchens, where he was known as "Chummy".

The City Swiss Club announced their summer dinner and dance at Brent Bridge — price 6/6.

A week later readers were informed of the great success of the London team of Swiss gymnasts at the Centenary Federal Gymnastic Festival at Aarau, where they scored 142 points with "laurel first class".

The last issue in July 1932 told of Swiss unemployment figures of 41,441.

Every issue of the "Swiss Observer" at that time carried a report on football activities in Switzerland. Mariann.
