Many compatriots will have read with sorrow of the death of the Rt. Hon. Lord Nathan of Churt, P.C., on 23rd October. The obituary notices in the British press gave ample proof of the unusual personality of Lord Nathan, and the many services he rendered his country and his countrymen. Some of our compatriots may not realise that he was also senior partner of Messrs. Herbert Oppenheimer, Nathan and Vandyk, who have been legal advisers to the Embassy since the first World War. For over forty years the firm have rendered our country and the Swiss Colony in Great Britain untold services. When the former senior partner, Mr. Herbert Oppenheimer, retired Lord Nathan became the head of the firm. His advice on British as well as international law was much in demand and highly appreciated. His vitality, his tremendous knowledge of men and affairs have been of the greatest assistance to all who sought his help. He was well known to our authorities at home, and, like his predecessor, he loved Switzerland.

His death is a loss indeed, because we have not only lost a wise counsellor, but also a true and warm-hearted friend. May his ashes rest in peace.

APPEAL BY THE COMMITTEE OF SWISS CATHOLICS IN LONDON

Encouraged by the result of our last year's Christmas Draw, the Committee has decided to hold one again this year instead of having a bazaar. The drawing of the prizes will take place on Friday, 13th December 1963. The object of the Draw is to give added financial support to our Chaplain, The Reverend Father Joseph Scherer, in his effort to look after the several thousand young Swiss temporarily in this country for studies, training or domestic work.

The School at 48, Great Peter Street, where our Youth Club held their regular weekly meeting in the past, is being rebuilt and closed down this summer. It was, therefore, necessary to find other accommodation. We have been very fortunate to secure the Westminster Ball Room, 30 Strutton Ground, S.W.1, where our Youth Club holds Socials every Sunday evening, with a varied programme such as dances, films and colour slide shows, talks, etc. These functions are regularly attended by 120 to 150 young compatriots.

During the summer months the Club organised excursions to the Isle of Wight (130 people), Cambridge and Ely (80) and Windsor Castle (80). Further visits were made to the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey and to the Houses of Parliament in session, etc.

The Committee is making strenuous efforts to rent and furnish a room in the West End of London, where our Swiss Youth can meet and spend their free time in a little corner away from our beloved Switzerland.

The permanent members of the Swiss Catholic community are unable to carry on, as well as they would wish, this valuable work which is growing from year to year and is so very important to the good reputation of our young Swiss compatriots in Great Britain, without calling upon the generosity of all our friends.

May I, therefore, ask you kindly to consider helping our work by sending either a donation or a gift in kind for our Christmas Draw.
