NEWS FROM THE COLONY



JEAN SCHEUERMEIER †

The Swiss Colony in London will note with regret the passing away, at the age of seventy-nine of JEAN SCHEUERMEIER on 18th April 1964.

The deceased hailed from the Canton of Zurich. He was born on the 8th January 1885 in Dübendorf, where he received his early education. He served his apprenticeship as florist with a firm in Zurich and to gain further experience, he subsequently spent some time at Baden-Baden, Germany.

He came to London in 1908, at the age of twenty-three and took up employment with a firm of florists in Bond Street, London W.1. In 1910, the then Board of Directors of Frascati Restaurant Ltd., having recognised the promising and outstanding qualifications of the young floral artist, engaged his services as floral decorator at their renowned West End Restaurant, a post which the deceased discharged with great distinction for over forty years and until the Restaurant closed its doors in 1954. During all these years, in addition to the regular and outstanding floral decorations at Frascati Restaurant, the late Jean Scheuermeier invariably and personally also carried out all the varied and greatly admired floral decorations of the Fête Suisse and the Swiss Church.

From his early youth, Mr. Scheuermeier was a very staunch supporter of the Y.M.C.A. movement and for twenty years he served as President of the Swiss Y.M.C.A. in London. During that time he took a very keen interest in young compatriots who came to England temporarily in order to study English and British business methods. Many are the young men who found an ever open house in Cromwell Avenue, Highgate, later in Mill Hill and until the outbreak of the second world war in Canons Park, Stanmore, where they were not only regally entertained, but also, where they received sound, friendly and understanding advice in all their problems.

For many years, the deceased was also a member of the Swiss Church and the Nouvelle Société Helvétique.

With approaching age, Mr. Scheuermeier retired to Studham, Beds., where he died. After a funeral service at the Parish Church of Studham, the earthly remains of our friend were interred at the Church Cemetery on 21st April 1964. Throughout his long, fruitful and blessed life, the deceased retained Swiss Nationality. Although he had lived fifty-six years in England, a country he dearly loved, he remained a true and faithful Swiss at heart.

He leaves a widow and two daughters to whom we express our deepest sympathy in their sad loss.

Applications by letter should be accompanied by a stamped addressed envelope. Prices of tickets: Adults 15/-, Persons under twenty-five 7/6, Children under twelve free.

May I again ask my fellow-members to give themselves *rendez-vous*, on Friday, 12th June, on board the M.V. "Royal Sovereign" to spend a happy evening in congenial company.
