RECENT DEATHS IN SWITZERLAND

- Bernhard Biner (64), Zermatt, prominent mountain guide and local politician; well-known in mountaineering and winter sport in many parts of the world.
- Frau Anna Riemensberger-Zimmermann (103), Maennedorf (Zurich); enjoyed good health up to her death.
- Carl August Hug (71), Arbon, publisher of the "Oberthurgauer" and Chairman of the printing and publishing firm of A. Hug & Co.
- Luigi Cattori (55) Locarno, President of the Ticino BGB Party and of the Ticino Farmers' Union.
- Emile Briner (87), Geneva, Professor of Chemistry at Geneva University from 1918-54.
- Pietro Bert (71), Primadengo/Faido, Commune President; killed in a road accident.
- Caesar Petrig (85), Zermatt, former well-known mountain guide; one of the first guides to combine mountaineering with ski-ing; co-founder of the Ski Club Zermatt; climbed the Matterhorn still at 70; father of fourteen, three of whom also became guides.
- Erwin Wenger (59), Berne, Administrator (Verwalter) of the "Verbandsmolkerei Bern GmbH."; Major in the Army.
- Frau Elisabeth La Roche (89), Basle, musician and expert in eurhythmics; lived abroad at times.
- Prof. Gottlob Schrenk (86), Arosa, for many years Professor of Theology at Zurich University; Dean of the Faculty for two periods; Honorary Doctorate awarded to him by the University of Muenster (Westphalia).
- Frau Berty Guggenheim-Wyler (73), Zurich, member of the Executive Council of the Jewish Women's Federation in Zurich for more than thirty years and its President from 1926-51 and later Honorary President; active in many other welfare organisations.
- Frédéric Nobs (71), Bienne, journalist.
- Marcel Henry (81), Porrentruy, Commune Councillor and Member of the Cantonal Parliament; concerned with the development of his town and the Jura.
- Robert Hegi (51), Rheinfelden, Commune Councillor and Well-known confectioner; for many years President and later Honorary President of the Swiss Bakers' and Confeccioners' Association; designer of the Confectionery exhibited in the food sector of the EXPO.
- Dr. Walter Kussmaul (70), Basle, natural scientist; for over forty years with Sandoz AG of which company he became a Deputy-Manager.
- Dr. Fritz Dickmann (66), Basle, lawyer and former Liberal politician.
- Dr. Conrad Meyer (62), Rueschlikon, well-known Zurich lawyer; for nineteen years President of the Chamber of Commerce Germany/Switzerland; Colonel of Infantry.
- Roger Calame (46), Boudry, President of the Boudry/Neuchâtel Court of Justice.
- Ernest Lederrey (85), Berne, studied law in Lausanne, but joined the Army as instructor; Chief Instructor of the First Division; member of several Red Cross missions; since 1959 member of the Institute for Strategic Studies in London; author.
- Madame Volette Disérens (76), Echandens/Lausanne, well-known painter and art teacher.
- Dr. Ernst Moll (86), Berne, former Chairman of the Board of the "Bernische Kraftwerke AG"; specially concerned with the development of the Oberhasli works.
- Robert Monnet (80), Lausanne, journalist, Editor of the "Tribune"; doyen of the Vaudois Press; member of the Légion d'Honneur of France.

- Madame Victor Armleder (80), Geneva, President and Managing Director of one of the biggest hotels in Geneva and prominent in Swiss catering circles.
- Dr. h.c. Emile Dreyfus (84), Basle, well-known philanthropist industrialist who gave millions to the Jewish community, the University and the Basle Zoo.
- Abbé Joseph Schubel (78), Fribourg, for many years at the Cœur Jésu Church in Geneva.
- Jean Arnold (58), Sierre, Manager of the Swiss Bank Corporation at Sierre; President of the Citizens' Commune, former member of the Valais Parliament; musician connected with the "Compagnons des Arts".
- Arnold Bally (75), Schoenenwerd, successfully in the service of the Bally-ribbon factory since 1912, Managing Director.
- Otto Kaetterer (72), Basle, former teacher at Frauenfeld; from 1927 to 1957 Inspector of Gymnastics; in command (Colonel) of a Basle Territorial Regiment during World War II.
- Werner Staub (82), Chairman of the Board of a chocolate company at Morteau and Le Locle, President of the "Convention Chocolatière Suisse", since his retirement in 1963 its Honorary President.
- Heinrich Gerteis (69), Winterthur, former Secretary of the "Schweiz. Verband für Wohnungswesen"; member of the Zurich Cantonal Council.
- Pierre Leuba (64), Geneva, Chief of the Protestant Press Service, for many years Pastor in the Canton of Vaud, Editor of "Le Protestant".
- Alfred Oulevay (69), Morges, former Vaudois Councillor of State; owner of the biscuit factory of the same name; member and President of the Vaudois Bank Council and member of the National Bank and other Boards; owner of large vineyards and a racing stable.
