The death occurred on the 24th January, at the age of 56 of Mr. Harvey Douglas, Manager of the Zurich Group of Companies operating in the British Isles.

A NEW MAP OF SWITZERLAND

The Federal Office of Topography in Berne has just published a new 1:500,000 map of Switzerland on a single sheet. This new map measuring 78 x 57 cm, is printed on syntosil paper, a specially strong material resistant to damp, tearing and stains, and capable of being folded and unfolded an indefinite number of times without fraying. Beautifully printed in thirteen colours with contour lines for every 200 m., the new map gives an extremely clear picture of the relief of the country. Covering an area of 240 miles from east to west, and 150 miles from north to south, it shows the whole of Switzerland and large parts of the neighbouring countries. This achievement of the Swiss Federal Office of Topography joins the fine series of maps which have built up the reputation of Swiss cartography, such as for example the maps of Switzerland on a scale of 1:50,000 and 1:25,000.

Used for passports, cheques, banknotes and other valuable documents, it makes forgeries quite impossible and cannot help but meet with considerable success throughout the world.
