ROCK CLIMBING

Mr. Jim Kennard of Bowles Mountaineering Training Centre in Sussex will give an illustrated Talk at the Nouvelle Société Helvétique

Members and friends who will attend the Open Meeting of the London Group of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique at the Swiss Hostel (9-11 Belsize Grove, N.W.3), on Thursday, 19th October have a great treat in store. Mr. Jim Kennard, an experienced, top-rate mountaineer will give a Talk on climbing with the help of his superb collection of slides. In addition, he will also show a short film of the work done by Bowles Rock Trust Ltd., the training centre for mountaineering at Bowles near Crowborough in Sussex.

Readers of the "Swiss Observer" are familiar with the activities of Bowles Rocks Trust, for it has been featured on several occasions. The first time, the blessing of the Chapel at the Centre was reported on, a faithfully and lovingly produced replica of the Schwarzseekapelle near Zermatt. Early in September 1966, we carried a picture of a wood carving of Madonna with Child, which the people of Zermatt had given to Bowles Chapel. Finally, in April this year, the "Swiss Observer" reminded its readers of the excellent work done by the Trust under the able directorship of Mr. J. G. Walters. H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh is Patron and Lord Rupert Nevill, D.L., J.P., President of the Bowles Rocks Trust.

The Mountaineering Centre provides all kinds of physical training, and the natural rocky site on the border of Kent and Sussex affords an excellent opportunity to study every kind of technical mountaineering problem. There are beginners' climbs and experts' ascents, and experienced tuition is given at very reasonable fees. There is a swimming pool, too, and a club house as well as the Chapel which provides the spiritual uplift that goes handin-hand with the strenuous physical exertion of climbing.

On 19th October, there is a chance to get detailed information, apart from being able to enjoy lovely climbing pictures. Mr. Walters hopes to accompany the lecturer, and the evening promises to be extremely interesting.

MR PAUL LEHRIAN 70

As was reported in the last issue of the "Swiss Observer", Mr. Paul Lehrian of 6 Sherrock Gardens, Hendon, N.W.4, celebrated his 70th birthday on 9th October. This more or less coincides with his retirement from the catering business after 55 years of distinguished service. He is one of the few remaining men who was at the Carlton with Escoffier

Mr. Lehrian started his career at the Schlosshotel, Waldhaus Flims, having been born and educated in Lausanne. Before coming to London in 1914, he also worked at the Suvretta House at St. Moritz. In England, he held various posts including at the Monico Restaurant in London and the Metropole Hotel in Brighton. Next came his appointment as a head waiter at the Carlton, and from 1917 to 1921, he worked with the Canadian Trade Mission in France. For a time he was assistant manager of the St. Petersbourg Hotel in Paris.

He returned to London in 1922 (Ritz Hotel), and then he became second in charge of the Grill Room at the Carlton (15 years). For 21 years he managed the "Ecu de France" and became a director in 1940. In 1958 he was appointed manager of the Charing Cross Hotel (5 years), followed by his last position as assistant to the general manager of the British Transport Hotels.

Mr. Lehrian has always shown a keen interest in the catering industry, especially the training side, and he is a Fellow of the Hotel and Catering Institute, a Governor of Hendon Technical College, and even now he will retain his interest in catering as a director of Wild Hotels Ltd. (Royal Court, Sloane Square, and Highcliff Bournemouth). He has been a member of the exclusive *Réunion des Gastronomes*, and the French Government honoured him with the Order of *Officier du Mérite Agricole*; he is also member of the *Conseil Culinaire Français*.

For many years, Mr. Lehrian was interested in the Union Helvetia, right from his arrival in this country until the Club was closed in Gerrard Street. He was a member of its various committees and President of the London branch. His son, incidentally, is an executive director of Grosvenor House.

We wish him many happy returns of the day and many years of contented retirement.
