THE CHRISTMAS PARCELS ACTION OF THE SWISS BENEVOLENT SOCIETY

Every year the "Swiss Observer" very kindly publishes our Christmas Appeal, and once again we are glad to say that the response has been a generous and most helpful one. The Committee is extremely grateful to the "Swiss Observer" for their co-operation, as well as to all individual donors, firms, and organisations who have contributed so handsomely towards making our action one of good cheer to our needy compatriots. A special word of thanks goes to the ladies of the *Frauenverein* and of the *Réunion de Couture* for all the very nice and warm garments they have made during the year and which are so greatly appreciated by elderly people.

Some 130 to 150 parcels are distributed every year by the Swiss Benevolent Society, but before they are sent out there is all the labour of love to assemble the hundreds of articles, measure them, allocate them according to a well-organised system of records. It takes a team of five or six volunteers three or four days to pack the parcels and ensure that all is done according to plan, the addition of food items, the despatch by parcel post or British Road Services or privately. Incidentally, Swiss patients in hospitals are sent a specially selected parcel of biscuits, chocolate, sweets, dried fruit, ovaltine products, etc.

A good job is done as shown by all the numerous letters of thanks which pour in from the recipients expressing contentment and real gratitude.

NEW SWISS AMBASSADOR IN LONDON

It was announced on Christmas Eve that the Federal Council had appointed Monsieur le Ministre Olivier Long, Delegate for Trade Agreements, as new Ambassador to the Court of St. James's, in succession to Monsieur B. de Fischer who has retired for reasons of age. Monsieur Long is expected in London shortly, and a more detailed account of his career will then be published.

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RETIREMENT AND NEW APPOINTMENT

The Anglo-Continental School of English, Bournemouth, wish to announce the retirement, at the end of this year, of their Director of Studies, Mr. D. E. A. Tucker.

Mr. Tucker, an accomplished linguist, was educated in Switzerland, served in the Wiltshire Regiment and the Machine Gun Corps throughout the first World War and was awarded the Military Cross. After a long career in the Colonial Service he came to the School in 1952 and played an active part in its successful expansion. He taught in the School for many years before becoming its Director of Studies in 1961, and is the author of several of the School's text books.

It is with pleasure that we announce Mr. Tucker's successor, Mr. Gustav Oetiker, 37, a Swiss national with an English wife and three children. Mr. Oetiker grew up at Männedorf (Zurich) and read Modern Languages at the Universities of Zurich and Paris. He has an intimate knowledge of modern educational methods and many years of practical experience at classroom and administrative level. Until October 1966, he was a tutor at Adliswil and at the Kaufmännischer Verein Zurich and secretary to the Educational Board of Adliswil. He was also Editor of the English section of the Swiss Stenographer, a member of its Examination Board and President of the Board's Zurich branch. Mr. Oetiker speaks German, English, French, Italian and Dutch. He will be a permanent member of the Company's Board of Directors.
