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LEON JAEGGI †

As anonunced in the last issue, we mourn Mr. Léon Jaeggi of 26 Woodville Road, N.W.11, who died after a long illness on 8th November at the age of 79. Mr. Jaeggi came to this country from Fulenbach before the first world war, but had to return when called up. He came back to London in 1918 and established his catering equipment company in Dean Street, Soho. In 1947, he purchased the factory at Staines and only this year, he saw the completion of the company's new £40,000 rebuilding programme. Up to his death, he was Chairman of Léon Jaeggi and Sons Ltd. in Tottenham Court Road, a well-known firm for catering equipment and for retinning and silver plating kitchen appliances.

Mr. Jaeggi was a member of the Cookery and Food Association and the Hotel and Catering Institute. But he also took a lively interest in the Swiss community; he was a member of several societies, including the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, Swiss Rifle Association and the City Swiss Club. He was married and leaves a widow, two sons and three daughters as well as six grandchildren. It is to Mrs. Jaeggi and the family that we express our deep

sympathy in their sad bereavement.

PROF. WERNER R. SCHWEIZER †

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Prof. Werner R. Schweizer, of 110 Riverview Gardens, Barnes, S.W.13. He died peacefully and unexpectantly after a musical afternoon on 17th November. Prof. Schweizer was born in 1891. Bernese by origin, he arrived in England in 1920. Twelve years later, he became Head of the German Department of the University of Nottingham, a post he held until his retirement in 1957.

In the spring of 1964, he published an interesting book in German called "Der Witz", but he had already written a book earlier on Baron K. F. Hieronymus von Muenchhausen. During recent years, he was preparing the material for yet another book on Muenchhausen. Prof. Schweizer was also a collector of Swiss art, and on one occasion he gave an illustrated talk on the Little Swiss Masters to the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, of which he was a loyal member. He was also a member of the City Swiss Club.

PAUL MASE JOSEPH WALKER †

We have just heard with deep regret that Mr. Paul M. J. Walker, of 29 Derek Road, Lancing, died on 13th April, having had to endure a long illness following a stroke.

He was a citizen of Solothurn and came to this country in 1915. For 20 years, he was with the Oerlikon Company and later represented the Zenith Watch Co.
