MRS. BETTY KELLER †

It is with deep regret that we announce the sudden death of Mrs. Betty Keller, wife of Mr. Robert J. Keller, of "Netherdale", Portnall Rise, Wentworth, Virginia Water, Surrey. She died in her sleep in the early hours of Monday, 1st April. The Cremation took place in close family circle on 5th April.

We express our heartfelt sympathy with Mr. Keller and their daughter Anna in their sad bereavement.

THE REV. CARL THEO HAHN †

It is with deep regret that we announce the death on 23rd March of the Rev. Carl Theo Hahn who was Minister at the German-speaking Swiss Church in London from February 1925 to December 1938. During the 14 years of his life in London he made a great many friends; some of them have themselves since departed, but those still here remember him as an outstanding personality of great courage and steadfastness, supported admirably by his cheerful wife whose sunny nature was as much missed after their departure as his unfailing help to anyone in need, spiritually and materially, day and night.

Pfr. Hahn was born in Geneva on 15th September 1895. He received his early education in Geneva and at Schiers. After matriculation and following in his father's footsteps, he studied theology in Geneva and later in Germany.

After he was ordained, he served as Assistant Minister in Austria for two years. Next, he was appointed Pastor of the German Seamen's Mission in Livorno in Italy, a position he held for several years until he accepted the position as Minister to the German-speaking community of the Swiss Church in London.

In May 1926, he married Miss Lily Meyrat who remained his faithful companion until death released her from long and cruel suffering at the early age of 56 (26th June 1959). This was a terrible blow to Pfr. Hahn, and he was never quite the same man any more after the loss of his Lily.

At the end of 1938, the Hahns had left London to take up residence at Sierre in the Valais, where he was appointed Pastor of the Eglise Protestante. During the war, Mr. Hahn preached every week in no fewer than four languages: German, French, Italian and English, as there were at that time quite a number of English and American residents.

His oldest friend in this country, Mr. F. G. Sommer, gave the main address at the Farewell Dinner and Presentation at Pagani's on 17th November 1938. With heartfelt appreciation he praised Mr. Hahn's great qualities, his idealistic attitude, his selfless devotion, his convincing faith, his fight for truth and justice and his gift for spreading the Gospel. Now he has gone to rest from his labours, but his friends will remember him and his wife with profound gratitude.
