## A SUCCESSFUL SWISS IN THE U.K.

In its January issue, the "Purchaser's Journal", a well-known publication devoted to the assessment of new industrial products, contained an article on "Workwear for Safety". Describing the activities of the companies engaged in the protective-garment field, the article naturally mentioned the firm of Airguard Ltd., which was founded 35 years ago by a compatriot, Mr. Willi W. Landauer. The article also pointed out that Mr. Landauer was a Fellow of the Institute of Company Accountants (FIAC) and a member of the London Chamber of Commerce. The aim of his company was to produce and market industrial protective wear of the highest quality available. Its activities were concentrated on the manufacture of industrial overalls, gloves, aprons and headwear under the Trade Mark "Guard".

The kind of material which Airguard has to order from its suppliers for the manufacture of overalls must necessarily be spun and woven in a special way, and this in fact has secured the success of the Guard J.601 overalls. More recently, the firm has developed and secured the exclusive rights

for an acid-proof material. When it had been officially tested, Guard contracid overalls fell into tremendous demand from the industries whose operatives face the hazards of contact with acids, such as the chemical, photographic and printing industries. As an additional proof of its recognition, Airguard has contracts with the Ministry of Defence, the UK Atomic Energy Authority, the GPO, the Ministry of Supply and the GLC.

Those of our readers who have read the Christmas number of the Swiss Observer in 1958 may remember that Mr. Landauer comes from St. Gall and that, having studied at the École Supérieure de Commerce of Neuchatel, he started on his career with the St. Gall Textile Company and was soon sent as a salesman to Egypt and the Sudan, where he stayed for four years. Having been struck with typhoid fever, he had to return to the healthier climes of Europe and spent a holiday in Great Britain in 1936. The country appealed to him and he decided to stay there to found his own company. Beginnings were difficult, as Mr. Landauer disposed of very little capital and had to struggle single-handed. But the company soon became airborne. The war brought about new opportunities and Airguard specialised in the construction of air-raid shelters and the manufacture of their necessary lining material.

It was commissioned, among other important jobs, with the restoration of the fabric of the Chapel of King George VI at Buckingham Palace and the air-raid shelter for Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands.

In 1958, the company was already well known for its patented unshrinkable cotton material and employed 200 people. Today, it has become public and continues to fare very well.
