THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SWISS RIFLE ASSOCIATION

This year's AGM of the Swiss Rifle Association was exceptionally well attended. The meeting, which took place at the Glendower Hotel, began with a minute's silence in memory of a member of long standing of the Association. Mr. P. Odermatt, who died last October.

Among the various points raised

in the Secretary's report and the President's survey, we can mention the encouraging intensity of shooting during 1970. No less than 5,060 cartridges were fired during eight meetings. Membership stood at 85 and there had been 27 new members during the year.

The President, Marcel Bucherer, told the meeting that he had been approached by the Marylebone Rifle and Pistol Club for a friendly match this year, as well as by the British Free Rifle Club. Mr. Bucherer had accepted the first proposal for this year, but had turned down the other, in view of the already tight shooting programme of the Association.

The Swiss marksmen of London can therefore expect to meet the Mary-

lebone Rifle and Pistol Club this year and probably the British Free Rifle Club the next. Both clubs are of high standards and have international competition marksmen. They will indeed be a challenge for the Swiss Rifle Association, which, however, has nothing to be afraid of. This year, as mentioned by the President, it met the Kensington Rifle Club. It got beaten in indoor small-bore shooting, but gave the Londoners a due beating when they came out in the open on the Siberia Range.

Mr. Bucherer mentioned the case of a member who had swapped his marking sheet because he hadn't been satisfied with his results. Our President condemned this lack of sportsmanship and indicated the administrative amendments to prevent such a thing from recurring. He also informed us that the next Federal Shooting Contest would not take place at Aarau, as had been originally planned.

Aarau had finally declined to embark into the considerable investments necessary for a venue of this nature. The Contest may take place in Fribourg.

The accounts were then commented by Mr. Straub, and showed some profit. Mr. Adolf Schmid conducted the re-election of the Committee. The main change was the replacement of Mr. Abegglen as Honorary Treasurer by Mr. Mathieu, from the Embassy. Mr. Abegglen's resignation from the Committee was motivated by his possible departure at the end of the year.

The Association's new rules and regulations were examined and passed by the meeting. The proceedings ended with a debate on the possibility of inviting female membership. This was turned down for the reasons given in the above message. This particularly long drawn AGM was succeeded by a lively dinner under the good care of Mr. Milani.
