If correctly printed, I would question the final paragraph of Father Bossard's letter (issue dated 23rd March). I am not in any way or sense a medical man, but I just cannot conceive that it is correct to state that "most of our diseases are the symptoms of the ills of a disordered and unbalanced mind".

I can imagine what distress this statement could cause to sufferers of say "cancer", smallpox etc. Surely it was not Father Bossard's intention to convey the impression that sufferers such as these have disordered and unbalanced minds. It may be disordered and unbalanced bodies which have some bearing, but not directly attributable to the mind. Admittedly the mind of a great extent rules the body but God made us in a very complex fashion and I would think that environment, external damage, exposure to viruses and so on would certainly have great bearing on diseases of the human body: cause and effect could be quite divorced from the mind. I cannot claim

to have any medical or theological training (except what an ordinary lay Christian would receive). I cannot even claim to be of Swiss origin, but I do read the S.O. and the item caught my eye. As a Christian I do endorse Father Bossard's contention that by faith (and prayer) restoration of both mind and body to full health is a practicable proposition and can be accomplished, "God willing".
