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Tree planting in Leeds

Prof. Inebnit then put the first shovel of soil into the hole in which the first of the 6 trees stood, assisted by 2 Park attendants.

A little "Robin" stole the show and became part of the ceremony. The group moved on to the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and finally to the 6th tree and everyone present had a chance to put a few shovels full of soil into the holes and stamping the soil firmly down so that the little trees would be secure. Eventually also Mr. Richard Mueller and his wife arrived and he was able to take a few pictures for the posterity. The party then headed towards the house of the Park Superintendent for some refreshments and thus ended a most impressive function.
