For the past five years Mr Rufer has been Swissair's manager for Ghana and Togo, based in Accra.



A Swiss Evening

On Tuesday 8 April the Cercle Français d'Esher (Surrey) had at its meeting monthly Monsieur André Ramseyer, the Press Attaché at the Swiss Embassy, as its invited speaker on "La Suisse Romande".

The audience, largely of the fair sex, consisted of local residents who meet regularly under the leadership of Mrs Josée Gray-Forton, to practice French conversation and reading. Besides a number of French and British nationals, there were also a few Belgians and three Swiss.

The speaker took his audience on extensive verbal an tour of French-speaking Switzerland, commencing from Geneva, his home canton, whose capital is now world-famous as the seat of many international organisations: UNO, Red Cross, ILO, etc, besides being an important centre for banking and the watchmaking and high-class jewellery trades.

For the "Pays de Vaud", M Ramseyer hinted at the long period of Bernese rule, during which it had embraced the Reformation; its agricultural wealth, and its easy-going people fond of good living.

The "Valaisans", the lecturer asserted, were hard-headed and

hard-working. Following the lead given by Englishmen in the last century, they had successfully exploited the tourist attractions of their mountainous region, while developing agriculture and industry in the Rhone valley.

Another mountain canton in the west was Neuchâtel, in the densely-wooded Jura, which had conquered the world with its fine watches from La Chaux-de-Fonds and Le Locle. Its appeal for the traveller had been proclaimed by the great Jean-Jacques Rousseau.

The first of the Romande cantons to join the Swiss Confederation had been Fribourg (AD 1481), famous for its charming, old-world capital, encircled by the river Sarine, and also for its catholic university and the Gruyère cheese.

Μ. Ramseyer concluded his interesting exposé by giving a brief report on the present position on the "Jura problem", following the two recent referenda.

The assembly had followed the speaker's talk very closely, as was evidenced by the pointed questions he was asked. A colour "talkie" on Lausanne, produced by the Swiss National Tourist Office, rounded off this enjoyable evening for the mind, while coffee, tea or a glass of wine provided solace for the body.
