GOOD RESULTS FOR ACROW

The financial press in Britain is rating Acrow (Engineers) as one of the best investment opportunities in a generally depressed stock market. This company was founded by our compatriot, Mr W. A. de Vigier, who continues to run this empire with great success as shown by the rise of its ordinary shares, which gained 8p on 54p on the strength of the 1974-75 results. This was a rare exception to the general slump of industrial shares in the City. Acrow (Engineers) realised a £5.89 million pre-tax profit during its last financial year. Exports shot up by 42 per cent last year, accounting for 43 per cent of total sales of £80 million. Exports in the current year are keeping pace and the

productivity of the company has been boosted in the past two years with heavy investments in new plant and traditionally good labour relations. Output per man-year increased during that time from £5,800 to £10,700.

The Acrow (Engineers) main range of products touch on civil engineering and general construction. The firm, which is only one of the Acrow group of companies, makes elements for scaffolding, steel structures, struts, bailey bridges, shuttering systems and other items of this nature.

NEW EXCURSION FARES TO SWITZERLAND

From 1 November Swissair will offer new excursion fares between the UK and Switzerland, available on all day flights and providing substantial savings on normal economy class return fares.

The new excursion return fare London-Basle and London-Geneva is £69.70, London-Zurich £73.70 and Manchester-Zurich £90.30. The fares are valid for one month with a minimum stay of six days, excluding the day of outward travel; their introduction means that for the first time one-month excursion fares are available on day flights between the two countries.

The main feature of Swissair's UK-Switzerland winter schedules is the operation of stretched DC-9-51 twin-jets on services from London to Zurich and Geneva, notably the peak morning and evening departures. The seating
