Obituary

PAUL BRUNO HABERSTICH

It is with great regret that we have to report the death of Mr. Haberstich on 27th December, 1975.

He was born in Basle on 9th September, 1899 and was a very well-known figure in the Swiss Community in this country, being a member of the Swiss Mercantile Society since the early 'twenties, also the Nouvelle Société Helvétique and from 1931 a member of the City Swiss Club.

After finishing his schooling he was apprenticed to the firm Imobersteg & Co. in 1916 and this was followed by his military service. In 1920 he came to London where he worked with the company, European and General Express until it merged with L.E.P. Transport Ltd.

On 1st May, 1931, Mr. Haberstich and the late Paul A. Moehr founded Acme Transport Co. Ltd., but Mr. Haberstich had to carry on the business on his own from August 1955 due to the sudden death of his partner. In 1960 the Company, Goth & Co. Ltd. of Basle took a financial interest in the Company and Mr. Haberstich retired in March 1966 but remained as a life Director.

He was married to Miss Marguerite Challange on the 7th July, 1922 and they were blessed with two daughters one of whom presented them with grand-children.

Mr. Haberstich is survived by his wife and daughters to whom we and his many friends extend deepest sympathy in their sad loss.
