A CHARITY which over the years has enabled hundreds of sick British children to recuperate in the Swiss Alps has now been wound up.

In its 24 years' existence Alpine Sun for British Children sent well over 300 children to Switzerland. But now time has caught up with it.

Advances in medicine, the economic climate and the 'retirement' of the administrator have all contributed towards the charity's demise.

Alpine Sun was founded in London in 1956 to send young asthmatics to Switzerland. All costs were met from funds except in cases where it was felt parents could afford to make a contribution.

For many years the children were sent to the Prasura Convalescent Home at Arosa, but latterly they were accommodated at Kindersheim Blumenhof at Oberageri.

Of the 342 children who visited the Swiss homes, 271 enjoyed between three and four months convalescence, 71 between six and seven months and one, 11 months. And almost 20 per cent were completely cured.

The winding up operation began in 1977 and was completed recently at the chambers of chairman Mr Anthony Cripps (nephew of the late Sir Stafford Cripps).

The reasons given were:

The decreasing number of eligible children due to improved health care and environment.

Bigger bills as a result of the exchange rate and inflation.

And the unwillingness of the charity to place any further demands of the time of their dedicated administrator, 77-

year-old Mr Alan Gowing.

So the work of a charity, highly regarded by the Swiss, now becomes a matter of historical record.
