## City Swiss Club welcomes new president

Only a small number of members and guests attended the annual general meeting of the City Swiss Club. The president, Mr H. Jauslin, expressed his delight to see so many young people among the audience. A special welcome was given to the most senior member, Mr Paul Bessire. The present membership stands at 204.

In his review of the club's activities Mr Jauslin said highlights included evenings with guest speakers Mr Charles Pritchard, city editor of the Yorkshire Post and Lord Miles, the founder of the Mermaid Theatre. The summer dance at Great Fosters and the annual banquet and ball at the Portman – at which a total of £2,088 was raised through the tombola for the charities which the club supports – were a great success.

Card evenings were held at the St. Moritz Club, and 44 members and guests attended the club's Christmas dinner.

The meeting agreed to an exchange of information on the club's forthcoming events with the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, as suggested by their president, Mrs Mariann Meier, with a view to attracting a larger attendance at the functions.

It was agreed to donate £500 from the charity fund to the German Speaking Protestant Church, the French Speaking Protestant Church, the Catholic Church, the Swiss Benevolent Society and the Swiss Welfare Office for Young People.

Mr Chris Roth was elected as the club's new president. The committee was empowered to elect in due course a vice-president, and the remainder of the former committee was re-elected.

The retiring President, Mr Jauslin, who had to take over his

office two and a half years ago at very short notice and under difficult conditions, congratulated the new president and offered his support.

In appreciation of 20 years' service to the committee, Mr Roth presented Mr Jauslin with a silver-coated cork showing the coat of arms of his Canton, the City of Basle.

## The Reverend Herbert Blum

IT IS with deep regret that we announce the death of The Rev. Herbert Blum, of Luftstrasse 26, 8820 Waedenswil, former minister at the Swiss Church in London. He died in his 68th year after a long illness which had compelled him to retire prematurely.

It was in the winter of 1945 when Sabine and Herbert Blum arrived in London with their large family. They had a difficult task. The German-speaking parish had to be brought together again after the war, and there was a great deal of work.

Both the minister and his wife gave of their best, and their activities were very beneficial. It was with great regret when the parish had to say goodbye to the Blums in December 1951.

Before his departure Mr Blum managed to ensure that the Swiss Church bought the Vicarage at 1, Womersley Road, which was his own property, thanks to generous donations by many members of the parish. Since then the house has been the property of the Swiss Church in London.

It is with great sympathy that we think of his wife, their seven children and their families who have suffered this sad bereavement. They may be assured that all those who knew Herbert Blum will remember with gratitude his quiet ways, his great gifts and his wisdom.

## Army team on target

THE Swiss Rifle Association held a 300m Schutzenfest at Bisley, devised by the association's President, Marcel Bucherer. Under his direction the scoring, control and catering were administered by committee members and their wives.

Notwithstanding the indifferent weather conditions a high standard of shooting was achieved. The Army Rifle Association team were over-

all winners, with a score of 1147 x 1200, with Arthur Clarke the individual high-scorer with 295 x 300.
